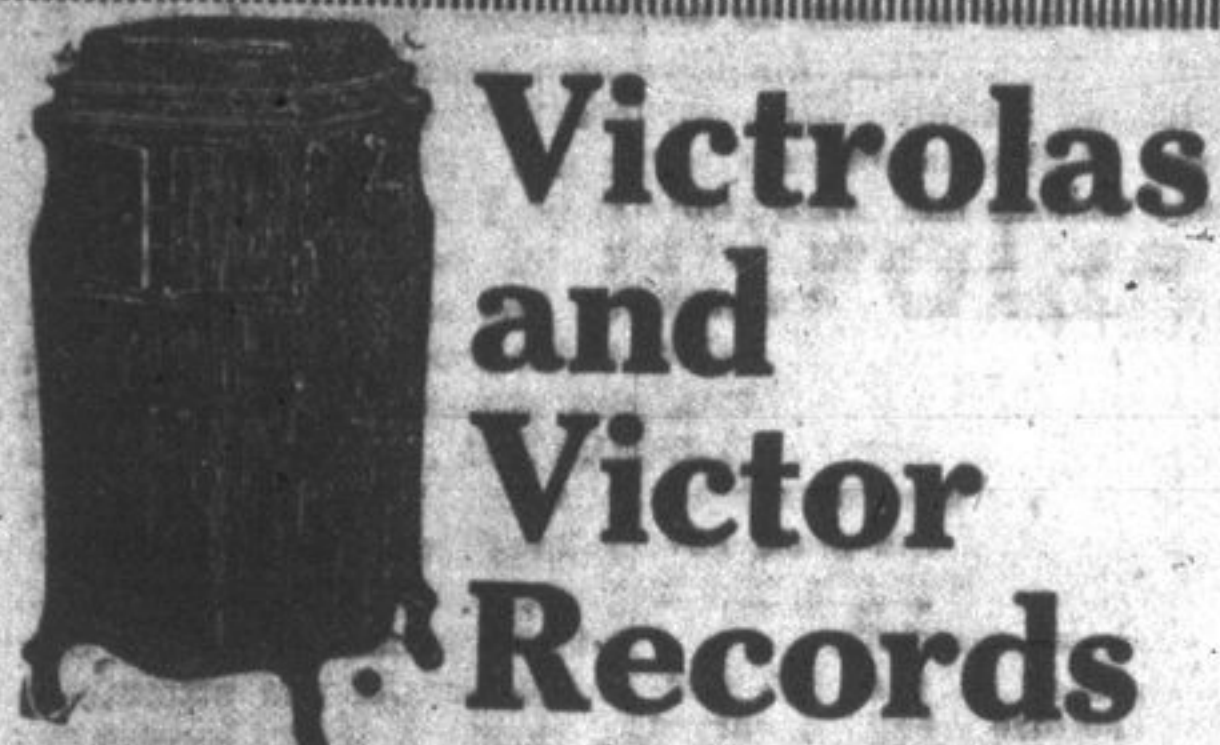

### TAX ON OWNERS OF AUTOS

PROPOSED BY BOARD OF WORKS TO BOOST GOOD ROADS.

To Place Before City Council Scheme Set Forth by Ald. Graham—Annual Tax of \$10 or \$15 on Car Owners is Suggested.

Ald. Graham, chairman of the Board of Works, is out with a plan to help boost good roads in the city by making an annual tax of \$10 or \$15 on the owners of automobiles.

If the scheme is adopted by the City Council and the members of the Board of Works, at their meeting Wednesday afternoon decided to put Ald. Graham's recommendation before the Council on Monday next. The Ontario Legislature will have to be appealed to, for power to make the tax.

Ald. Graham said he had given the matter much consideration and had interviewed many of the owners of automobiles in the city, and they had expressed themselves in favor of the scheme.

"If I was not the owner of an automobile I would not want to ask for a scheme of this kind," Ald. Graham explained to the members of the board. "I would gladly pay a tax to help get good roads, and I think every owner of a car will take the same view."

Ald. Graham stated that his idea of the tax was that all the money raised in this manner, should go into permanent roads. He figured there were about 1,200 autos in the city, and this would bring in an annual revenue of \$12,000 or more. He said the automobiles were to blame for the cutting up of the roads, and he considered that his scheme would be a good one. The Board was anxious to give the city the very best roads possible, but the great drawback was in finances.

After some discussion, all the members voted in favor of putting the recommendation before the Council. Chairman Graham presided at the meeting, and the other members present were Ald. Patterson, Cooper, Litton and Norris.

Ald. Graham also has a proposal to tax all the owners of horses \$1 a year for good roads.

The question of having the Kingston harbor dredged by the Government, to get prepared for the receiving of the big lake vessels after work on the Welland Canal has been finished, was brought up by the chairman, and it was decided to ask the City Council to appoint a committee to wait on the Minister of Public Works, at Ottawa, in regard to the matter. The Board of Trade will be asked to have a representative on the deputation.

The Board intends to get busy on road paving as soon as possible. A large amount of work has been planned. The city engineer submitted a report on the streets to be paved. It is proposed to have a macadam roadway on Montreal street from James street to the city limits, but from the feeling of the meeting, it is likely that this will be extended all the way from Princess street to the city limits, as it was felt that this entire stretch should be attended to. Kensington avenue from Union street to Edgell, is also slated for a similar roadway.

Sheet asphalt is proposed for the following streets:  
West street from Wellington to King; King street from West to Barrie; Stuart street from Barrie to Albert; Barrie street from Princess to North; Clergy street from Barrie to Ordnance.

The Board received a letter from the street railway company, asking what reconstruction work had been proposed for Brock street and portions of Ontario street, this season. The company only wanted this information so as to make provision for suitable rails, providing work was carried on.

On motion of Ald. Couper, the chairman, Ald. Litton, and the city engineer were appointed to wait on the railway company in regard to the matter.

The Board received a letter from the Board of Trade, asking that a deputation be sent to Ottawa, to attend the convention of the Eastern Ontario Good Roads' Association, on Feb. 4th and 5th. The matter will be taken up in council Monday night.

The city engineer was given instruction to call for tenders for sand required for the asphalt.

TEAS OF EXPERIENCE IN KINGSTON RECENTLY.

Gives Statement in Ottawa Regarding Remarkable Occurrence At a Kingston Hotel—Received a Message for Well-known Toronto Doctor.

Dr. Watson of Toronto, in his communication, with spirits on the "Twentieth Plane," and in other spirit worlds, was in Kingston recently. The Ottawa Journal had an interview with Mr. Benjamin, and when asked the question, "Have you had any further seances lately?" is reported to have said:

"Yes, we hold them once a fortnight. By the way, let me tell you a rather remarkable thing. About a fortnight ago I was in Kingston, sitting in the hotel writing room. Around me were a number of commercial travellers discussing politics. I was interested in the conversation and turned to listen. While I listened my hand, holding the pen, began to make motions, to move back and forward. I paid no attention to it at the time, but when the conversations were over and I turned to the paper before me, I discovered that my hand had written this message: 'To Dr. Abbott, Toronto: You have just been advised, or are about to be advised, of an important event affecting your future. Rev. G. B. Fasken.' I was amazed, and so I sent the communication on to Dr. Abbott. The letter reached Toronto in the morning, and was telephoned to Dr. Abbott's office by his wife at three o'clock that afternoon. The doctor was simply amazed and took little stock in the message, but that very evening, only a few hours later, he received a message which, according to his own testimony, will greatly affect his whole future." Mr. Fasken, a prominent Presbyterian pastor, of Toronto, has been dead several years.
