## QUEEN'S EASILY DEFEATED BY CITY TEAM.

T. Millan Received a Bad Cut Over the Right Eye That Put Him Out of the Game.

Kingston intermediates won their second game from Queen's Wednesday night by a score of 9 to 0. The Kingston team combined fast skating, weight, and dexterity with the stick and beautiful team work. They rolled up a score of six goals in the second period, but in the third Queen's put up a gallant fight. The collegians were unable to score themselves, but the puck only reached their net once. The ice was good, but there was not a large attendance, and the failure of Queen's to score and give the city team a race for it, made the game a one-sided affair. Hagerman made many beautiful runs, and he had a strong mate in Derry, who showed clever work in a mix up. The whole personnel of the Kingston team was superior to Queen's.

The game was called at 8.30, and the first goal was made by T. Millan, who a few moments later had a fall and received a bad cut over the right eye that put him out of the game. Smith was the next to score. The period was not distinguished by fast play on either side. It ended 2 to 0. The second period was called at 9.05, and Kingston had it very much their own way, Derry making four goals, Smith one, and Brown one. Derry was penalized, and McDermott had a bad fall, turning a somersault backwards, which squeezed the wind completely out of him, but he gamely stayed in to the finish. The gong came none too soon for Queen's, for the score stood 8 to 0 against them.

In the third period, which started at 9.45, Queen's put up a plucky fight, and Walsh had to look to his laurels as a goal keeper, and he maintained his record by keeping the puck away from the net. Graton, Brown and Casterton were penalized, and Hagerman made one goal. Queen's played their best in this period, but Queen's defence was too strong, and Queen's men had to make long shots.

## AWARDED A MILITARY CROSS.

A Son of E. C. Mitchell, London, Has Won It.

Lieut. J. C. Mitchell, son of E. C. Mitchell, London, Ont., a former Kingstonian, has been awarded the Military Cross. At the outbreak of war he was taking a science course at McGill University. During the term of 1914-15 he drilled with the McGill College contingent and was anxious to go overseas with them, but on account of his youth was prevented. Upon going home in the spring he attached himself to the 6th Field Battery for instructional purposes and came to Kingston and took a course in the Artillery School, from which he was gazetted as lieutenant. He was then attached to the 29th Field Battery, stationed at Guelph, and when that battery went overseas in 1915 he was recommended by his colonel for an important position. The authorities at Ottawa would not grant this request on account of his youth and on account of the short time he had been with the forces. He went overseas with the 55th Field Battery the following August and after a period of intensive training in England, was sent to France with his battery and has been in active service ever since. He was appointed A.D.C. to General Odium, of the 11th Brigade, 4th Division, and was wounded early in September last at the battle of Amiens. Upon recovering from his wounds and learning that the position of A.D.C. was held open for him, he decided to accept it and is at present with the forces near Mons.

Arthur Mitchell, a brother, is in St. Lucia, West Indies, where he has been for about two years. He is with the garrison there. Some time ago he was promoted as O.C. of La Toc Battery, which position he now holds.

## A Memorial At Vimy Ridge.

Capt. A. W. Asselstine, of the 2nd Canadian Battalion, writing to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Asselstine, 220 Albert street, enclosed a picture of a memorial erected at Vimy Ridge to 192 men of the 2nd Division who were killed in the explosion of a mine. The mine was afterwards converted into a memorial. It was in the form of a large crater about fifty feet in diameter and twenty feet deep, levelled off at the bottom, and terraced, with steps going down one side. At the bottom is a large square about twenty feet by thirty feet in brick, stone, bordered with white stones, and a large cross bearing the letters "R.I.P.", 2nd Division, Canadian, 9-4-17, also in white stones. At the foot of the memorial stands a white cross bearing the names of the men who were killed.
