COUNTY GRANTS ASKED COLLECTING CITY GARBAGE
 BY GENERAL HOSPITAL AND THE SALVATION ARMY.
 The Suburban Road Area Commission Asks for \$15,000 for the Work it Proposes Doing This Year.
 The Frontenac County Council on Thursday afternoon received two deputations which asked for grants. A delegation from the General Hospital, consisting of R. E. Kent (chairman), Dr. J. C. Connell, F. G. Lockett and Mayor Newman, asked that the hospital grant for 1919 be increased \$2,000 owing to the heavy cost of maintenance. Dr. Connell outlined to the council the scheme for the enlargement and re-organization of the hospital. He said he did not intend at present to announce any definite amount which the county would be asked for, but the Board of Governors expected Frontenac would do its duty by the hospital as a partner later on, when the scheme was completed. The nucleus of the hospital fund is \$100,000 from the late Dr. James Douglas of New York, formerly chancellor of Queen's University. The Ontario Government is being asked for a grant of \$100,000 for five years, and Dr. Connell said he had a promise of another \$100,000 provided the scheme went through. The city of Kingston and the adjoining counties would also be expected to contribute to the scheme, which would cost in the neighborhood of \$600,000. It is hoped to have the work of building started this year.
 George E. Smith, local chairman of the Salvation Army war fund, introduced a deputation to ask the council for a grant of \$10,000 as Frontenac's share, instead of making a canvass of the townships. The delegation consisted of Organizer Dickson, Dr. J. W. Edwards, M.P.; A. M. Rankin, M.P.P.; W. F. Nickle, M.P.; Adjutant Smith and the chairman of the township organizations formed some time ago when it was first decided to make a canvass. Organizer Dickson said that other counties had contributed liberally, mentioning the county of Hastings, which gave \$12,500. Mr. Rankin and Dr. Edwards said that public opinion in the county was in favor of a grant to the Army fund. W. F. Nickle made a rousing speech, and paid a compliment to the splendid work done here by Adjutant and Mrs. Smith, who are in charge of the Kingston citadel.
 A report was presented showing that last year \$31,770.43 had been expended on the good roads system. The Ontario Government was asked to reimburse the county council with the usual grants in proportion to the amounts expended for new work and maintenance.
 A. M. Rankin, of the Suburban Area Commission, asked council for a grant of \$15,000 for suburban area work this year. His request was referred to the finance committee.
 The council passed a resolution approving of the work of the United Farmers' Association and promising its co-operation.

FEAR ICE FAMINE.
 Ferry From Brockville to Morris-town Operating.
 Brockville and points along the River St. Lawrence are facing an ice famine. There is scarcely a vestige of ice in the big stream which this time last year was frozen solid and the crop of ice all harvested. The weather is so mild that the ferry service operating between here and Morris-town, N.Y., and small craft are seen frequently on the river. These extraordinary conditions have not prevailed in many years before. Ice dealers are viewing the situation with some apprehension.
WHALEBACK HAS BEEN SOLD.

 Although no official information could be secured, it is understood that the steamer Adakokin, of the whaleback type, which is now at the yards of the Collingwood Shipbuilding Company, has been sold for trade on the Atlantic coast, and will be taken from here as soon as navigation opens, and as a result the repair work which was planned to be done here will not be carried out. It was originally intended to have the bow of the vessel undergo extensive repairs. The vessel is owned by the Montreal Transportation Company.
