ZION ANNIVERSARY DAY

REV. DR. WILSON AND REV. DR. MORGAN PREACHED.

Rev. Dr. Macgillivray Occupied His Former Pulpit in Chalmers Sunday Morning—Musical Service in Cooke's.

The anniversary services of Zion church were held on Sunday, and were of special interest because of the fact that the pastor, Rev. J. D. Boyd is to retire shortly after being in that church for twenty-nine years, and having been responsible for its establishment. Rev. R. J. Wilson, D.D., preached at the morning service, and based his message on the words, "Stand Steadfast, and ye shall win your souls." He pointed out that in order to win their bodies and their minds, men have to make great efforts, and that souls can only be won by the same methods. He illustrated his sermon by stories of the war, and said that the only religion worth having was that which could only be attained by constant and strenuous effort.

Rev. Dr. William Morgan, at the evening service, preached an inspiring sermon to a large congregation. He said that the highest attainment which a man could have in life is not what he can get out of anything, but what he can put into it; not what he can get others to do for him, but how much he can do for others. He applied this to the church, pointing out that the important thing was not how much one can get out of the church, but how much one can put into it. Before the war, people in this country and people coming to this country used to consider only what Canada could do for them, but the war changed that, and made them consider what they could do for Canada. The greatest example of this was the life of Christ, who came not to be ministered unto but to minister, and to give his life as a ransom for many.

Dr. Macgillivray Preaches. "Your old minister finds it good to look into your faces once more," said Rev. Dr. Macgillivray, who occupied the pulpit of Chalmers church on Sunday morning. Dr. Macgillivray preached a beautifully phrased and impressive sermon from the text, "Lord thou hast been our dwelling place in all generations."

Musical Service in Cooke's. An exceptionally large congregation attended Cooke's church on Sunday evening, when a special musical service was held. The choir sang the anthems, "The Radiant Morn" (Woodward), and "Holy Father, Cheer our Way" (Bert Couper), son of Ald. Daniel Couper, of Kingston. Mrs. J. C. R. MacPherson rendered as solo "My God and Father, while I Stray" (Nevin), and Lieut. A. G. M. Strowger, sang "Nearer, My God to Thee" (Carey), both of which were sung in splendid voice. Rev. W. Taylor Dale, preaching on "The Privileges of Priesthood," made a strong attack on the formalism which is prevalent in the present-day churches.

POLICE STATISTICS GIVEN

IN ANNUAL REPORT SUBMITTED BY THE CHIEF OF POLICE.

During 1918, Kingston Police Made 209 Arrests and Issued 294 Summonses—Fewer Arrests Than in 1917, But More Summonses.

A report of the work of the police for the past year has been prepared by Chief of Police Robert Nesbitt, and submitted to the Board of Police Commissioners. Some interesting statistics are given. The arrests made during the year totalled 209. There were 294 summonses issued for infractions of the city by-law.

In 1917, the police made 281 arrests and 173 summonses were issued. The arrests made during the year included 101 for intoxication; infraction of the Ontario Temperance Act, 27; thefts, 23; absent without leave, 2; vagrancy, 18; desertion, 5; unlawfully wearing the King's uniform, 1; forgery, 3; fraud, 4; housebreaking, 1; obtaining money by false pretences, 2; keeping disorderly house, 1; indecent assault, 3; abusive language, 1; threaten to kill, 2; horse stealing, 3; receiving stolen goods, 1; infraction of the Infant Revenue Act, 1. In 116 cases, fines were imposed; thirty-eight cases were dismissed. In ten cases there was suspended sentence.

The nationalities of prisoners is given as follows:

English, 16; Irish, 8; Scotch, 9; Canadians, 168; United States, 4; miscellaneous, 4. There were 198 prisoners who could read and write, and 11 who could not. There were 126 single and 83 married. Protestants, 124; Roman Catholics, 85; males 187; females, 22. The revenue from carters and team licenses amounted to \$200; single carters, \$500; livery stable license, \$30; omnibus license, \$75; cab license, \$80; automobile license, \$730; second-hand store licenses, \$340.

AS A RESULT OF THE WAR

OPPORTUNITIES FOR CHRISTIAN WORK HAVE BEEN EXTENDED.

Dr. Farquhar Declared That Everyone Should Give Thanks to God For the Onward March of the Gospel.

"This is the time when every man, woman and child should give thanks to God for the march of the gospel of Jesus Christ," said Dr. Farquhar, literary secretary of the National Council of India, speaking at the service held in Convocation Hall on Sunday afternoon. Rev. Dr. Morgan presided and offered prayer. Dr. Farquhar remarked during the course of his address, that India was one of the countries most influenced by the war, and that great results were anticipated. Summing up his discourse, which was on Christian work, he stated that was the day for everyone to ask the question, "What is the duty of the church?" and to also ask the question, "What is my duty?" The answer ought to be, "We must go and preach the gospel. The world could be saved for Christ if all the Christians would come into real Christian unity."

Dr. Farquhar stated that the opportunities for Christian work had extended beyond all expectations as a result of the war. Many new fields of labor had been opened up. There were many places now awaiting the gospel message. Never in the history of the world had Christianity taken such a place as to-day. At the great peace conference which was now in session, it was recognized that we were all brothers, and that peace must be made secure for all men. It must be made safe for small nations as well as big nations. It was God's religion that taught us this. The speaker declared that God was preparing the church for greater needs. Missionaries would see miracles. There were many things in the war which would tend to lead us to peace.

RELEASED FROM JAIL

Frederick Grange, of Napanee, Set at Liberty.

A message was received in Kingston on Saturday afternoon from W. E. Loyat, governor of Napanee jail, informing the G.W.V.A. that a telegram had been received from Hon. I. B. Lucas, attorney-general, ordering the release of Frederick Grange, whose case the G.W.V.A. investigated last week. Pte. Grange was, therefore, set at liberty on Saturday afternoon, having served twenty-four days of his sentence of two months' imprisonment on a charge of being drunk, which he emphatically denied, and refused to allow his name to be paid.
