Trades and Labor Council Appoint Committee to Meet General Manager Daniels of Dominion Textile Company.

The committee of the Trades and Labor Council appointed to confer with the representatives of the Dominion Textile Company and the Board of Trade presented the report of R. Easton Burns at the annual meeting on Thursday night for consideration. He stated that there were a number of grievances respecting conditions that required to be investigated and Mr. Daniels, general manager of the company, had been asked to come to Kingston and meet the committee. This he promised to do at the beginning of next week. A resolution was passed that the committee be appointed to meet Mr. Daniels along with Prof. Mitchell.

Mr. Burns' report showed that there had been considerable increases in the wages paid since the beginning of the war. The full report appears on page 6.
