I returned, arriving here in July, and it cost \$125 for myself and little son to get back here, which all had to be saved out of my own allowance.

Had I stayed longer, as I wished to do, I should have been that much to the good. Why not treat us all alike? Is not one soldier as good as another? They all fought for the same noble cause.
