HURON AND ERIE TO DOUBLE CAPITAL

Shares Will Be Worth Hundred Dollars—Toronto Branch Office. At a special meeting of the shareholders of the Huron and Erie Mortgage Corporation, to be held immediately after the annual meeting on Feb. 12th next, a proposition will be submitted to take \$2,500,000 from the reserve fund, and add this to the amount of the capital stock, bringing it up to the sum of \$5,000,000. The new capital is to be distributed pro rata among the shareholders, but the total capitalization is to be divided, giving the shares a value of \$100 each instead of \$50 as at present.

Temiskaming Takes Over Mines.

Shareholders of Temiskaming received somewhat of a surprise at the annual meeting when it was announced that the directors had decided to seek fresh fields and pastures new for their capital by the invasion of the British Columbia fields. They have taken over the Daly Varden and Wolfe mines in the Pacific provinces.

It is expected that the next quarterly dividend on International Nickel common will be fifty cents a share, as compared with recent quarterly declaration of \$1 a share.

Bank Doubles Capital.

The Banque Provinciale du Canada has increased its paid up capital from \$1,000,000 to \$2,000,000 and also increased its dividend rate from 7 to 8 per cent. per annum.

W. W. Butler New President.

W. W. Butler was elected president of the Canada Car and Foundry Company at the annual meeting. He succeeds the Hon. Nathaniel Curry. Mr. Butler was formerly vice-president.

Commercial Notes.

Upwards of 300,000 gallons of gasoline and kerosene and more than 8,500 barrels of crude petroleum were produced in Alberta in 1918. The shareholders of the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company have taken up the entire issue of \$3,700,000 of ten-year seven per cent convertible bonds recently authorized by the company.

Canadian Lumber Merchants.

Canadian lumber merchants are greatly perplexed over transportation difficulties and lack of shipping permits. The Belding Corticelli Silk Company of Montreal reports the best year in its history. New Brunswick's parcel of \$450,000 in six per cent bonds, maturing in fifteen years, was brought on Saturday by A. E. Ames & Co. Tenders were opened at Fredericton at noon, and the Ames Company offer of 100.35 was accepted.

Annual Statement of the Mutual Life Insurance Company.

The annual statement of the Mutual Life Insurance Company of New York shows that the company paid \$5,100,000 in dividends to its policyholders in 1918, or \$2,513,431 more than the total payments received from policyholders. Since the organization of the company in 1843 total payments to policyholders have amounted to \$1,465,000,000.
