The report that British warships now off Oporto prevent Portuguese Government vessels from bombarding the city is untrue. It was officially stated at Lisbon.

President Wilson has been forced to abandon his proposed visit to Belgium. It is understood that in the event he returns to Europe he will accept the Belgium invitation.

An international wage law and prohibition of "pauper" labor, are proposed in a memorandum submitted to the labor committee of the Peace Conference Saturday by American labor representatives.

The French Government has decided to install an airplane service to feed inhabitants of the redeemed districts of Northern France until railways destroyed by the Germans in their retreat can be restored.

Toronto's great packing house concerns appear to be thoroughly satisfied with the decision of the Dominion Government to build a million dollar cold storage plant at Montreal in connection with the export business in meats and dairy produce.

Mr. Daly filled his role of "Larry O'Connell" most effectively, and gave a number of Irish melodies in his sweetest voice. William F. Pfarr and George R. Richardson, in their distinctive Irish roles, showed themselves to be splendid character actors. Miss Kirwan Forest was a pleasing Irish lass. The other members of the company filled their roles well. During the intermissions, Fredo and Primrose, vaudeville artists, gave the musical numbers in place of the orchestra.

### GERMAN "FUNK HOLES."

Men Who Engineered War Took No Risks.

The former headquarters of the Kaiser and his general staff is disclosing some extraordinary queer facts these days about the men who engineered the world war. Take, for one, Hindenburg, Germany's superman, around whom reams of poetry have been written, disclosing him as a fearless Napoleon leading his troops to victory. As a matter of fact, he spent a great deal of time in a wonderfully constructed "funk hole," or dugout, under the grounds of his villa here.

Spa, it may be noted, is almost on the German border and so far from where the line was to be that it was almost a day's journey in a fast motor car to get within sound of the big guns. The Kaiser, too, had similar hiding places at Neu-Bols, near a comic opera trench system about which he is said to have paraded for the benefit of motion pictures. At each of their villas there were delicate electrical instruments which would set up furious buzzing whenever an airplane approached anywhere near. At the first sound from this contrivance Hindenburg and the Kaiser used to run to shelter, it is reported. People who worked about Hindenburg's establishment said that he was continually running for cover.

Allied representatives on the International Armistice Commission are now occupying Hindenburg's headquarters, and they were amazed when they discovered this underground refuge of the great warrior. The entrance was through the dining-room. From there a flight of steps led down to a tiled ante-room which, by the way, now serves as a very good pantry for the victors.

From the tiled room there was another flight of steps that led down to the real dugout. This was blocked by a huge iron door about one inch in thickness, which could be locked from the inside only. Within it was fastened by a double bolt which could do great work in a Canadian banking establishment.

The dugout itself was luxuriously equipped. On the floor was a heavy lowered carpet and a Louis XV table and chairs added to the artistic arrangement. The walls, which were encrusted with iron wires painted white and the whole place brilliantly illuminated by electricity. On a little table was an electric fan to keep the marsh cool in summer, while an electric stove provided for heat in winter. The room was about 14 x 12 feet and was protected by four to six feet of earth above it.

The emperor's dugout was similar, except that it was much deeper under the ground and there were two entrances, one through the villa and the other from the grounds. The main entrance was from the house and led down a long flight of steps.

Another touch to the pictures was added to this when a German resident of Aix-la-Chapelle told the correspondent of the Associated Press that the crown prince spent virtually all of his time in amusement.

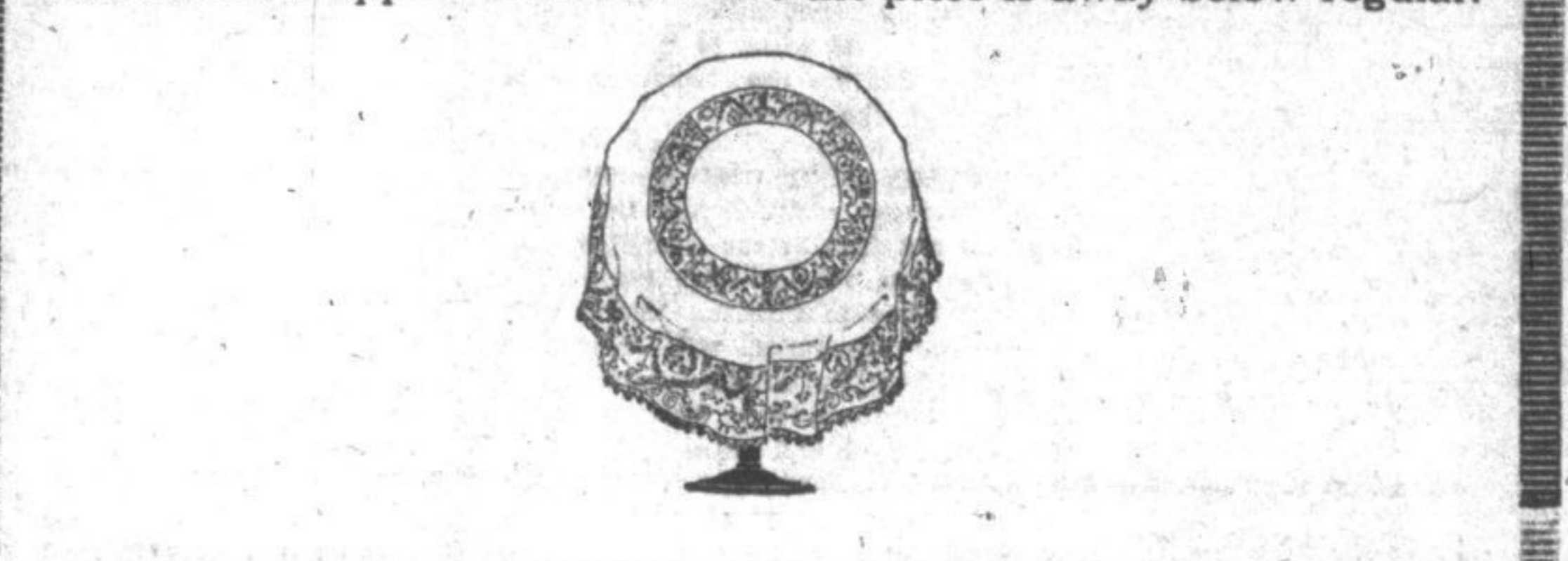
