

J.D.S.-Permanent Force men who are discharged from the service are entitled to war gratuity. No provision has as yet been made for men returning to their permanent force units on return from overseas, as at present all permanent force men are members of the C.E.F. The service

overseas counts towards pension. J.V.W .- Payment of the war service gratuity was commenced on Feb. 4th, and will be continued in the rotation in which applications were received. You are entitled to the difference between four months' gratuity at \$70 a month if single or \$100 a month if married, and the amount of post-discharge pay you received. 
