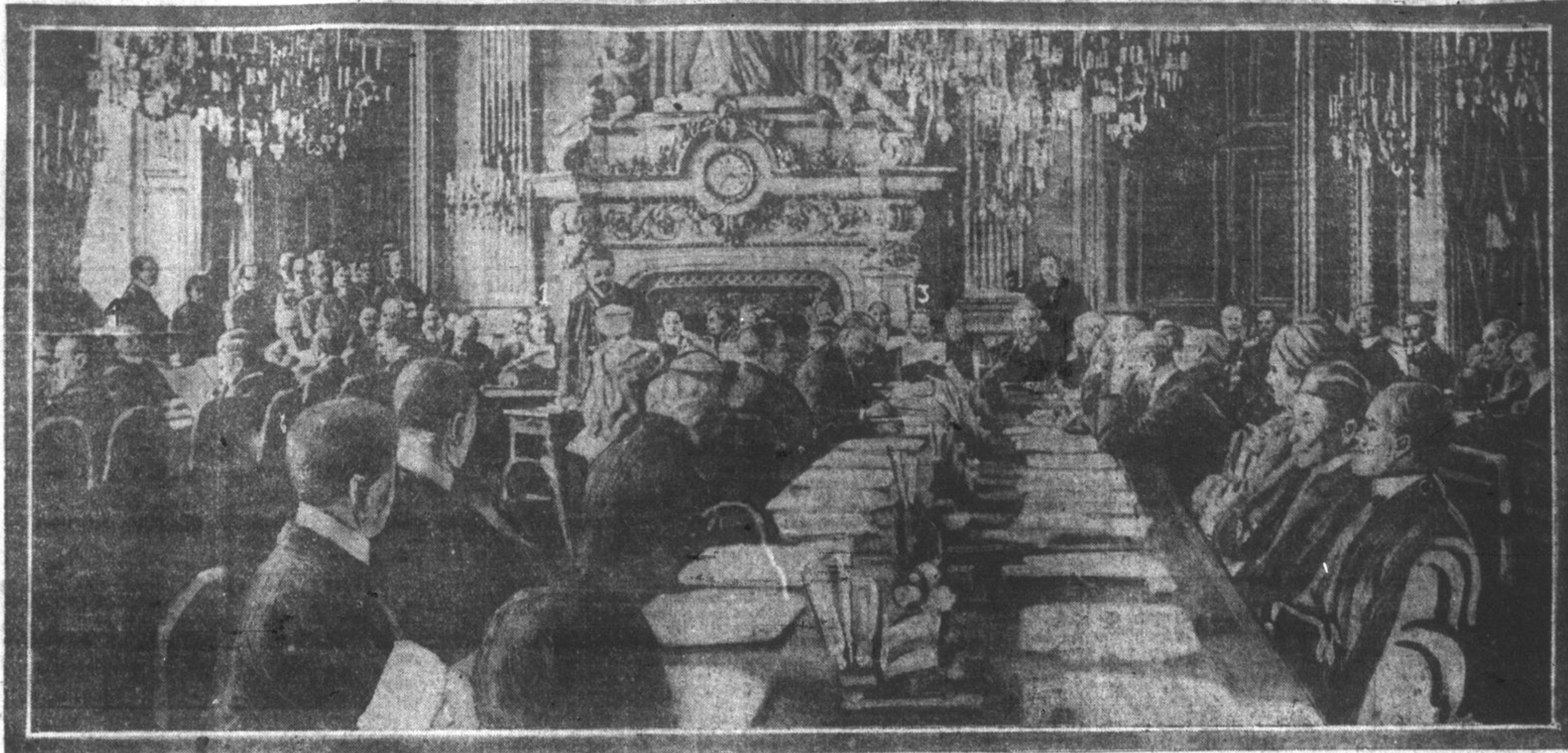
GANANOQUE

As a result of the several bold "holdups" reported recently in the surrounding district, Justice of the Peace, George Hunter, is receiving applications from the people living in the country, for a special permit to carry firearms.

The law requires that a person shall have special permission to carry firearms.

Deceased leaves, besides a widow, four sons and four daughters, Norman, Alexander and George, Oso; Pte. Franklin is overseas; Mrs. J. Cobb, Oso; Esther, Mable and Mary, at home. The deepest sympathy is felt for the bereaved widow, as her son, Pte. Harry, died of influenza on Oct. 21st in England. The funeral took place from Christ church, Oso, conducted by Rev. Mr. Williamson, Tuesday, after which the bereaved family paid their last respects to their departed brother. Deceased was fifty-four years of age.

SUNDAY Y.M.C.A. MEETINGS. Rev. W. Taylor Dale Declares the World is Getting Better.

At the 415 men's meeting held in the local Y.M.C.A. parlors on Sunday afternoon the subject "Is the World Getting Better?" was dealt with by Rev. W. Taylor Dale in a very interesting and helpful manner. It was Mr. Dale's first meeting at the "Y," and his forceful address was listened to by the largest attendance of the season. The speaker took for his text the petition, "Thy Kingdom Come" from the Lord's Prayer. He believed that many good people prayed this prayer in sincerity and at the same time advanced the pessimistic view that the world was getting worse. The speaker while allowing that others had a right to their opinion, still maintained that the world was getting better, enumerating in an optimistic and convincing manner the great reform agencies which were all at work in the interests of the kingdom. Jesus Himself was a great social leader, and His life and work laid the broad foundations for the great advances in reform work that we see developing all around us. The fact that representatives are to-day gathered around a peace table to make laws in the interest of righteousness and liberty convinces Christians that people at large want to see the principles of Christ's kingdom put into operation.

The gymnasium Bible class at 10 a.m. had twenty-five young men in attendance. The speaker, Harold Bttinger, spoke to the boys on "Training," picturing Jesus as the head "coach" and teaching many lessons on discipline and self-control.

The junior Bible class, which met at 9.30, had another twenty-five boys gathered together in the front parlour of the "Y," where a good address was given by Harry S. Warwick, who took for his subject "The Living Christ."

Six Months' Sentences. Belleville, Feb. 10.—Albert E. Dunk, Arthur Palmer and Charles Wellman, three young men, were sentenced to six months in the Ontario Reformatory for breaking into a warehouse of the H. Corby Company's distillery at Corbyville and stealing a quantity of liquor. They were previously fined \$200 or three months in jail for having liquor in a place other than their residence.
