### BELLEVILLE WAS DEFEATED

#### KINGSTON WON BY 6 TO 1 AND CAPTURED ROUND.

In One of the Liveliest Games Pulled Off at the Covered Rink this Winter—Local Boys Won the Round by a Margin of Three Goals.

Kingston came from behind in the intermediate O.H.A. game at the covered rink on Monday night, and defeated Belleville by a score of 6 to 1, and captured the round by a margin of three goals, the score in the final of Belleville on Friday night being 3 to 3 for Belleville.

The local boys showed themselves to be a real team all the way through the piece, and now have the decks cleared to meet Cornwall or any other team the O.H.A. wishes to trot along, and, travelling at the present clip the home boys have reached. It will take some team to put it over them. The Kingston boys displayed "pep" at every stage of the game, and well deserved the victory. The best team won.

And it was a pretty fair exhibition of the winter sport at that. True, it was somewhat rough at times, but "Bobby" Hewitson, of Toronto, who handled the bell, was always "Bobby" on the spot for the rough stuff, and he handed out some good shots, but Boland, who emphasized the old, old saying, that a game cannot be won on the bench.

But to get back to the game again, it was watched by a big crowd, and everyone outside of Belleville, pulled for the Kingston youngsters to win. Belleville came down with quite a number of supporters, confident of victory, after the two-goal lead in Belleville, but then you can't always sometimes tell—but enough said. Belleville made the set-to a lively one, and up till the third stanza it was anybody's game. The ice was in pretty fair condition.

The first period started off with both teams going strong, but there was no scoring. The play, for the most part, was around Belleville's goal. Kingston made about a dozen good shots, but Boland was there every time to stop them. On one occasion, his chest protector was the target.

"Terry" Millan started the fireworks for Kingston two minutes after play was resumed in the second period, when he scored on a handy long shot. Belleville evaded up a few minutes later, after some strenuous play, when Arnott scored on a clear-cut poke at the nets. Then it was for Hagerman to do the honors.

"Terry" Millan came across with another, and the second period ended with the score 3 to 1 in favor of "our boys."

Both teams lagged a little the first part of the last stanza, but Kingston eventually struck their stride, and when they once got going it was Kingston all the way on the scoreboard, but Belleville put up a plucky

fight. "Terry" Millan scored two more goals, and Hagerman got one. All three goals were of the clear-cut type, and well aimed, and the crowd had good reason to stand on their toes and cheer. Some almost stood on their head.

The Millan boys, "Terry" and Ruby, played a horse of a game. "Terry" without doubt, put up one of the best exhibitions of his career. Walsh was given a few anxious moments around the goal, but he was always able to clear himself. Hagerman was sent to the bench quite often, but while he was on the ice he showed class and is certainly a power of strength to the team. It is a pity that he had to decorate the side lines so often. "Joe" Smith, put on as a "sub," played a star game. He has speed, and is a most aggressive checker. He is recently home from chasing the flims, and no doubt his training overseas did much to develop him as a hockey player. The crowd gave him the glad hand and he is bound to be heard from in the hockey world from now on. "Punch" Derry also played a good game.

Arnott and Sutherland were the shining lights on the Belleville team. Our own "Bouncer" Brouse was also present, but he did not get going very strong at any stage of the game. Box was laid out once and had to be carried off the ice.

Boland in goal for Belleville, had a pretty busy session, and had a dozen or more wicked shots, and his good work prevented a very much higher score for Kingston, as time and time again the local boys made for the nets with shots that looked like sure goals. The scoring was done in this order:

The game was fast and furious at times. "Bobby" Hewitson had to do some queer stunts at times to keep on his pins—or beg pardon on his skates.

My, but wasn't it a grand and glorious feeling when Kingston put over three in that last stanza to, so sort of put the game on ice, as the baseball fans say.

"Oh the way now," yelled one of the Belleville supporters when everything looked about even between the teams. But Belleville found it a long way to the nets, and a hard road at that.
