Military Matters

A recent order is to the effect that all N.C.O.'s and men who are on "duty" are to wear a red distinguishing patch on the upper parts of their sleeves.

Several of the officers at the armories are now wearing a ribbon of watered silk which is issued to all soldiers who were in the front line in 1915. It is understood that a star will be issued in the near future to all who are able to wear this ribbon.

Sergt-Major John E. Marshall, of the Canadian Engineers, stationed at Brockville, has come to Kingston to undergo an operation at Queen's Military Hospital.

Hereafter a reward of \$10 may be paid to any civil or police officer for the arrest and conviction of any M.S.A. defaulters in groups 1, 2 or 3.

Ten overseas soldiers with their dependents, who came over on the S.S. Tunisian, are expected to reach Kingston on Wednesday.

The winners of the second round of the billiard tournament at Mowat sanatorium were Badour, Nelson, Wilkinson, Lavelle, McDonald and Brof. Sewell and O'Brien had byes. The Mowat boys have accepted the challenge of Queen's military hospital to a tournament, and arrangements are now being made.

On the S.S. Metagama due at Halifax about the 17th, are 3 officers and 13 men for Kingston district. Of the S.S. Prince Juliana due about the 18th, are 4 officers, 7 cadets and 6 other ranks.

Lieut. D. C. McDougall, C.F.A., and W. C. McCusker, of the 5th C. M. R., have returned from overseas and reported at headquarters on Monday. Lieut. McDougall proceeded to Marvelville, Ont., and Lieut. McCusker went to Ottawa.

ORDERED RELEASED FROM PENITENTIARY Military Defaulters Cannot Be Sent Here For Less Than Two Years.

The Minister of Justice on Monday issued an order for the discharge from the penitentiary of Thomas and William Fitzgerald, of Hinchinbrook, and James Babcock, of Bedford, three Frontenac county young men, who on the 4th inst. were sentenced by Police Magistrate Farrell to one year in prison for being defaulters under the Military Service Act. The claim was made that penitentiary sentences of one year could not be given, that a man can be sent to the penitentiary must receive a minimum sentence of two years. The three young men above named are at present being held in the county jail awaiting the disposal of their cases. They hope to be freed altogether on this technicality instead of being resentenced to central prison.

54 ALIEN ANARCHISTS TO BE DEPORTED

They Caused a Row on Arriving at Hoboken For Ellis Island.

(Canadian Press Despatch) New York, Feb. 11.—Fifty-four radicals, alien born anarchists, Industrial Workers of the World and others, arrived at Hoboken today on a train from the west, en route to Ellis Island immigration station, where they are to be deported. As the second group of men was led from the train, three cheers for the Bolsheviks were given and three more for the I.W.W. One I.W.W. member objected and struck a policeman on the nose with his fist. Others of the I.W.W. closed in. The police came to the rescue of the man attacked, and not until clubs had been used freely and effectively were the I.W.W. members subdued.

FINES WERE IMPOSED

In Two Cases Under Military Service Act at Nananee. Inspector James Graham, of the Dominion Police Force, was in Nananee, where he prosecuted in the case of some young men charged with being defaulters under the Military Service Act. The cases came before Magistrate Rankin. Joseph Brennan, of Lonsdale, was fined \$100 and costs, and J. H. Young, of Marlbank, was fined \$200 and costs. The case of James E. McMullin and W. C. Casady were remanded until Feb. 24th, and the case of Michael Lynch was laid over till Feb. 17th. Brennan and Young had been ordered to report for duty on October 15th.

BOLSHEVIKI DEFEATED

South-east of Archangel—Their Losses Reported Heavy. (Special to the Whig.) London, Feb. 11.—The Bolsheviks launched an infantry attack on Saturday against Allied positions near Hromakrenga, south-east of Archangel, and were repulsed. In operations Friday in which British, American and Russian troops improved their positions on the Petrograd road south of Kadish, the Bolsheviks suffered heavy losses.

Andrew Allan, Montreal, Dead. (Canadian Press Despatch) Montreal, Feb. 11.—Andrew Allan, member of the well known shipping family, who at one time owned the Allan line of steamers, died here this morning, following an operation for cancer. He was born in Montreal, 1849.

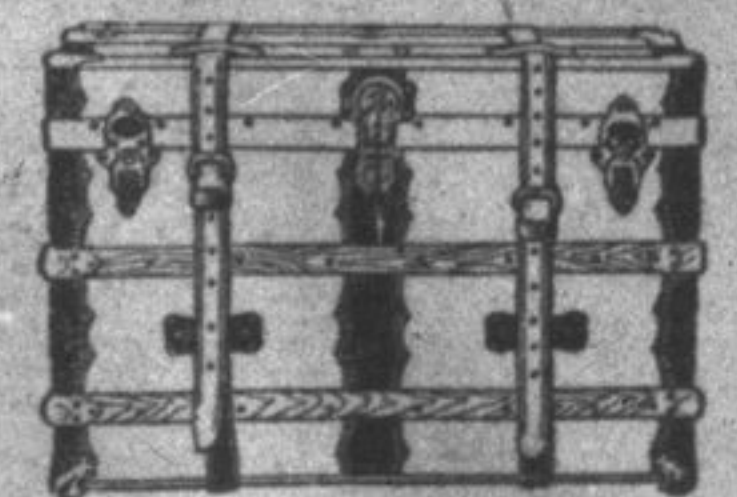
