MORE MONEY FOR SHOES.

Orders For Two Million Pairs Offered by France.
There is quite a ripple of excitement in the shoe and leather trades, owing to the report that large orders for civilian footwear, said to aggregate over two million pairs, have been offered by French houses to manufacturers in Montreal and Quebec. Details as to prices have not transpired, but it is understood considerable figuring is being done on cost of leather, findings and labor. Leather values are firmly held and some large sales are reported within the last few days for Britain, for cash, the goods being stored subject to shipping orders. Calf skins advanced two cents a foot last Thursday, which makes an increase of eight cents since the war ended. It is also stated, in manufacturing circles, that waxes are now twenty per cent. higher.

Military Matters

The final for the billiard tournament cup was played off between ex-Pte. Badour and ex-Pte. Bron, the game was one of the best played yet at the McWat. Bron won. The prize offered for the biggest break was won by ex-Pte. Wilkinson with a break of 39. A smoking concert was held at the final game.

The Kingston men on the hospital ship Araguaya, which arrived at Portland, Me., on the 13th, are J. C. Hutchins, F. W. Pritchard and C. H. Kempling.

A hospital train will arrive at the G.T.R. station this evening containing casualty cases. These include two officers, five tubercular cases, eight amputations, two blind and forty-five other cases. Thirty-eight mental cases proceeded direct to Cobourg.

All the machines at Camp Rathbun will fly to Leaside, beginning this week. None but trained men will be used to pilot the planes to their new quarters.

The hospital ship Araguaya, which arrived at Portland, Me., is the first to come by the new route, which was decided on when the demobilization plans were made. It was decided to bring all hospital cases through this port to avoid any possible inconvenience at Halifax or St. John. It is possible that part of this boat load will be arriving in the city this (Saturday) evening.

With a great number of men returning from leave to be discharged, the staff at the discharge depot at Barriefield has been very busy this week. It is expected that before long the present system will be changed and all troops come direct to depot and be discharged and then given transportation to their homes. At present soldiers are given two weeks' leave at Halifax and report here on the expiration of that leave.

Sergt-Major Inst. Dawes and Sergt-Major Inst. Succoe, of the Instructional Staff, were discharged on Friday after completing over three years of very valuable work in training soldiers for overseas service.

In the report of the billiard tournament in the R.C.H.A. sergeants' mess on Friday, the name of Sergt-Major "Nobby" Clark was omitted. Sergt-Major Clark won the consolation prize from Sergt-Major Penate, W.O.

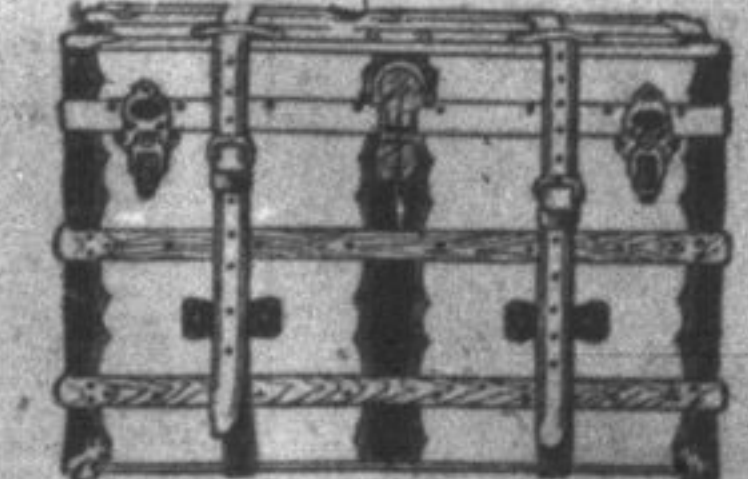
