PENNSYLVANIA RAILROAD

Proposes Increase of \$75,000,000 in Capital. The Pennsylvania Railroad Company announced that the stockholders at the annual meeting on March 11th will be asked to authorize an increase of \$75,000,000 in the company's indebtedness, to be made at such times as may be prescribed by the directors. The purpose is to provide for present and future requirements.

Protection from "Wild Cat" Men. Removal of the restrictions which the Dominion Minister of Finance placed over debenture issues two years ago, has resulted, it was learned in the Ontario Government considering the advisability of passing legislation at the coming session to protect the public from the unscrupulous "wild-cat" promoter. Such a law was drafted a couple of years ago by officers of the Attorney-General's department, but when the Dominion Government placed certain restrictions on the floating of loans, it was dropped. The Ontario Legislation will, it is stated, be presented at the coming session of the Provincial Legislature.

Twin City Had Poor Year. The annual report of the Twin City Rapid Transit Co. for the year ended December 31st, 1918, shows surplus after taxes and charges of \$691,302, equivalent, after deduction of preferred dividends to \$2,180 a share earned on the \$22,000,000 common stock, as compared with \$6.03 a share on the stock in the preceding year.

To Support Export Trade. H. S. Arkell, Canadian live stock commissioner, has been sent to Great Britain to investigate the embargo against live stock and meat shipments from Canada.

Steamships Will Not be Affected. Shareholders of the Canada Steamship Lines, Limited, will be particularly interested in the announcement that the earnings of the company will not in any way be affected by the recent reductions announced in ocean rates. It is officially pointed out that the boats of Canada Steamship Lines are under time charter for some time to come and on this account we are not in any way affected by the recent reduction.

Pulp Association President. J. A. Bothwell, Montreal, was elected president of the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association. The association voted \$5,000 for vocational training courses among mill employ-ees.

New Director of Moisons. After the meeting of the directors of Moisons Bank it was announced that E. J. Chamberlin had resigned from the board of directors and that J. W. Ross was elected to fill the vacancy. Mr. Chamberlin is in California, where he intends staying for some time, and it is understood that he is resigning all his Canadian duties.

Commercial Notes. The Bank of Toronto announces an increase in its dividend to twelve per cent. per annum. Canadian pulp and paper exports for November show an increase of \$1,955,845 compared with November 1917. The Twin City Rapid Transit Company earned only \$2.18 per share on the common stock in 1918, as compared with \$6.93 in 1917.
