KINGSTON AND LAURIER

THE EX-PREMIER RECEIVED L.L.D. FROM QUEEN'S.

First Spoke In This City In 1891—Came Here With Lord Aberdeen In 1898 and With Present King in 1901.

The flags are floating over the city buildings in memory of the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the liberal chiefest who was one of Canada's greatest statesmen. Kingston loved Sir Wilfrid from the first time he visited this city early in 1891, just before the general election of that year.

On October 16th, 1898, as premier, he visited Kingston to receive the honorary degree of L.L.D. at Queen's university. The same evening he spoke in the city hall at a public reception given to Lord and Lady Aberdeen and himself. Again he visited Kingston in October 1901, in company with King George and Queen Mary when they toured Canada as the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall, and he was the most commanding figure in the limestone city on that memorable day.

Sir Wilfrid has not been in Kingston since that time as he had so much confidence in Kingston returning the Hon. William Hartly in the succeeding general elections, in which the latter contested, that he then spent his time in endeavoring to enlighten constituencies in which the liberal gospel required to be preached.

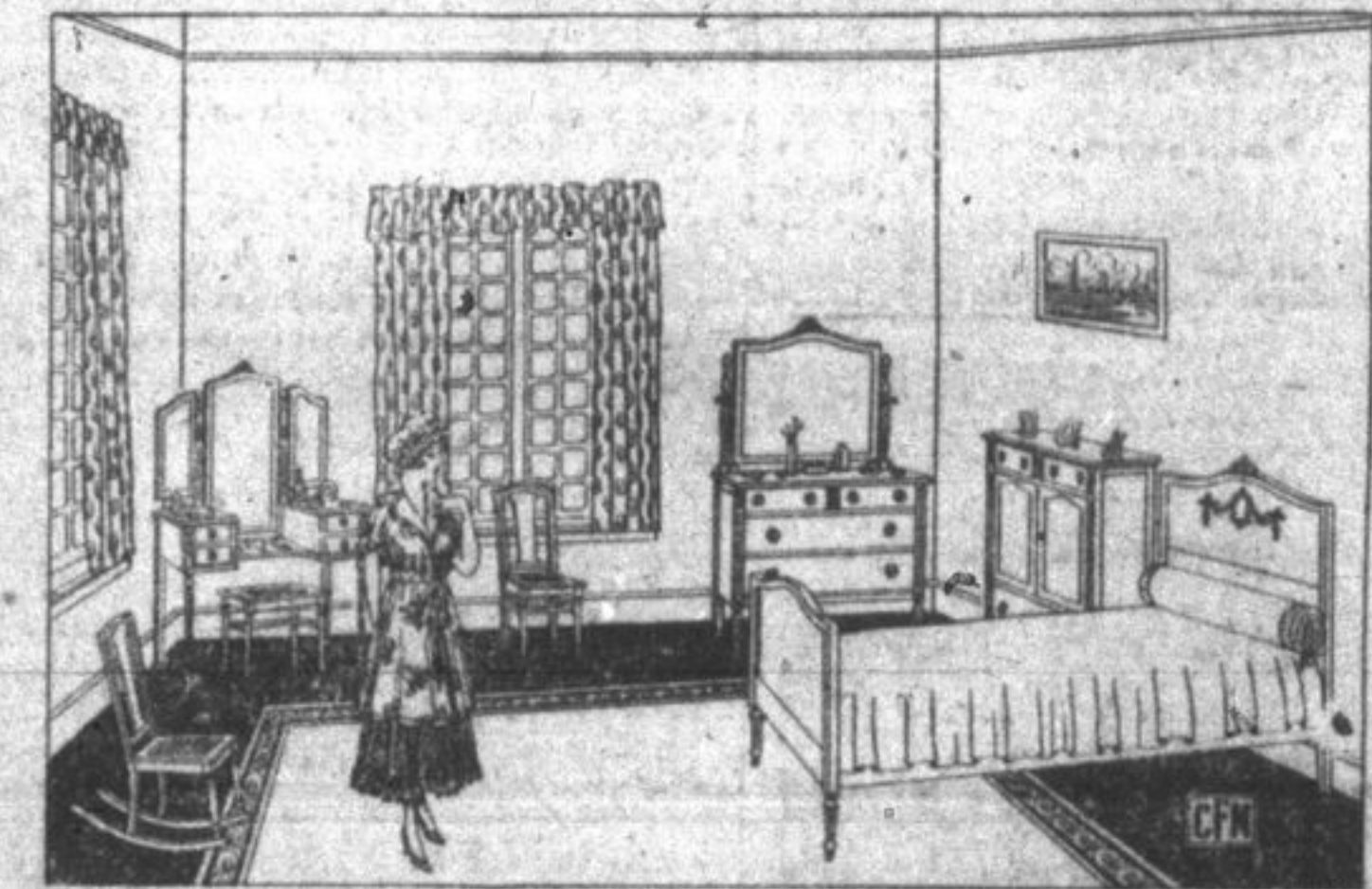
