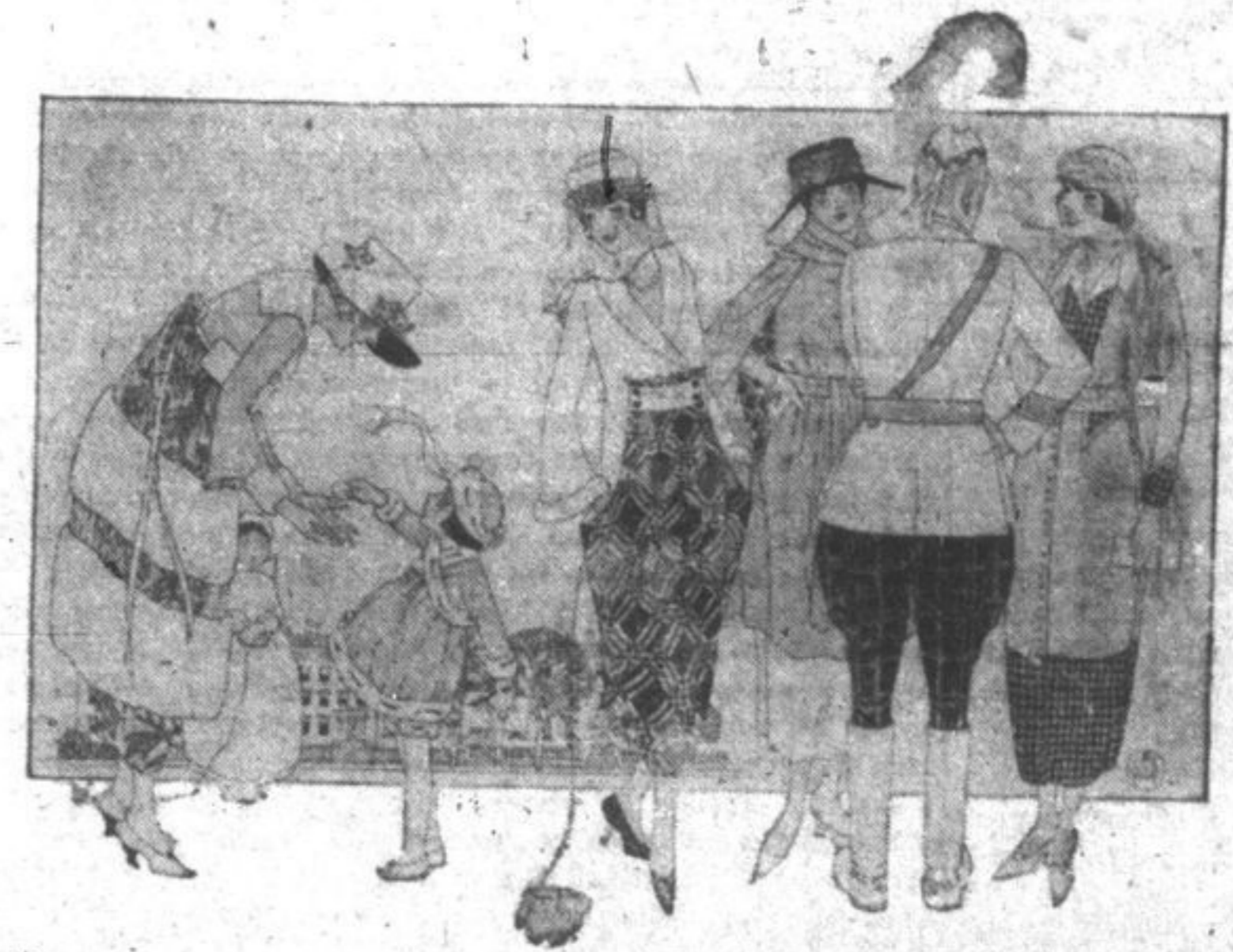

Condemns The Billboards.
 Kingston, Feb. 17.—(To the Editor): Your editorial re billboards was timely and to the point. It is certainly discouraging for anyone who year after year works to try and improve his surroundings to find that his labors are in vain, because his neighbor (in many cases a non-resident) is allowed to put up these unsightly boards enclosing a corner and thus shutting out a beautiful view of trees and shrubs, and spoiling what was otherwise a very pleasant neighborhood. Not only this, but some outcasts of society have written on the back of these boards language that is not fit for print, and this was a favorite rendezvous for the children from the school across the street, to read and rewrite filthy, obscene language. Still we wonder where our children learn bad habits.

I appealed to this man (who, by the way, is a trustee of the school) for the sake of the children, his own as well as mine, to remove the sign boards. His reply was that it was his property and he would do as he liked with it.

LAURIER'S GREAT MEMORY
 Recited in Detail Debate of Forty-three Years Ago.

The marvelous memory of Canada's Parliamentary Nestor and his grip upon the Parliamentary proceedings of over forty years was unexpectedly instanced in the House of Commons on September 7, 1917. Senate amendments to the income tax bill were before the House, and the point of order was raised that the Red Chamber could not amend a money bill.

Hon. Speaker Rhodes, after hurriedly consulting authorities, found a case in May, 1874, in which Hon. Alexander Mackenzie, then Premier, had moved to accept Senate amendments to an act respecting the appropriation of certain Dominion lands in Manitoba, stipulating that the action should not be accepted as a precedent.

"It so happens that I was a member of the House at the time," said the Wilfrid Laurier, rising. "I was, of course, a very young member then, but I have a recollection of the debate that then took place." The veteran Liberal leader then recited in some detail the debate of more than 43 years ago, differentiating between the land and the money bill, and the House. Meantime, the speaker had sent for the ancient Hansard, and subsequently placed the record before the House. It was in exact accordance with Sir Wilfrid's memories, and both sides of the House paid its senior member the tribute of hearty applause.

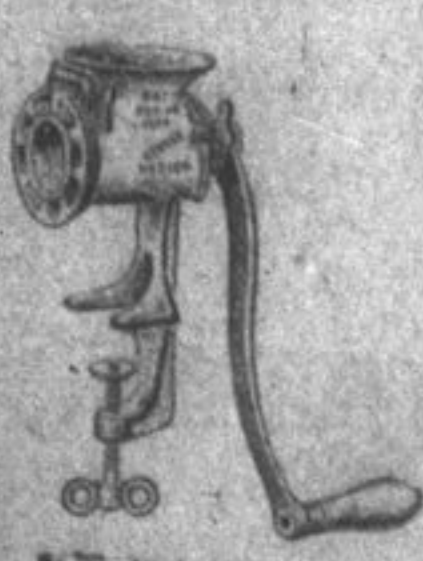
