A COMMITTEE IS FORMED

TO WORK WITH THE SOLDIERS' AID COMMISSION.

A Meeting Held in the City Council Chamber On Tuesday Afternoon—All Local Bodies Are Represented.

A large and representative gathering of prominent citizens assembled in the city council chamber on Tuesday afternoon to discuss the work of the Soldiers' Aid Commission in Kingston, and to re-organize the local branch. Mayor Newman occupied the chair. Lieut. A. G. Sandford, Inspector of Branches for the Soldiers' Aid Commission for M.I.D. No. 3, gave an interesting address on the work performed by the commission in connection with the soldiers' return to civil life. He said that in securing employment for the returned men, and in assisting him in any way possible when in difficulties, the Soldiers' Aid Commission were doing a splendid work, but that a strong local committee was necessary before the work could be carried on efficiently.

W. F. Nickle, M.P., also spoke on the work and needs of the commission. He told of how it was formed and gave instances of the splendid work it was doing. He added his appeal for a committee to that of Mr. Sandford. Ex-mayor Hughes followed with a short address, in which he told of how much of the work of looking after the interests of the returned men had fallen upon the shoulders of the mayor until the Soldiers' Aid Commission office was opened in Kingston. He had seen for himself the work of the commission, and felt that it was a thing which should be helped in every possible way. M. M. Hood, representing the G.W.V.A., and a representative of the Army and Navy Veterans' Association also endorsed the scheme of forming a strong local organization.

After the speeches, it was resolved that a committee for carrying on the work of the Soldiers' Aid Commission in Kingston be formed, and a nominating committee retired to draw up the committee. A large and representative committee was formed with Ex-mayor J. M. Hughes as chairman. The committee is as follows: four members to be elected by the City Council; W. F. Nickle, Soldiers' Aid Commission; J. M. Campbell, Board of Trade; Mrs. John Macmillan; Mrs. G. H. Ogilvie, Mrs. E. T. Steacy, Miss Goinz.
