The United States leads the world in scientific fish propagation.

Under normal conditions France makes 26,000,000 pairs of gloves annually.

An automobile jack has been invented that is operated by the motor of a car.

Doctors in Holland are experimenting with radium water as a medicinal beverage.

An inventor has added a strap-cutting to the familiar nail puller for packing cases.

Chili has adopted a standard time about sixteen minutes in advance of that formerly used.

Soluble coffee is being manufactured in stick form for the convenience of travelers.

A new English time recording machine for workmen uses thumbprints for identification.

An inventor has combined an electric light wall bracket with a rack for hats or clothing.

The Chinese government in planning to extend its system of wireless telegraphy into Tibet.

A patent has been issued for apparatus to enable a person to play a piano and violin at the same time.

A railroad in England supplies toys for children taking long journeys to relieve the monotony of riding.

For edibles served in glasses a glass has been invented with a sort of pocket on one side to hold a spoon.

An Englishman has invented a cover for hatchways on vessels that operates on the principle of a rollopp desk.

Electric service is available in 10,613 communities in the United States, compared with 3,545 served with gas.

Brazil's great wealth in coffee is due to a monk who planted two seeds in a Rio de Janeiro monastery garden in 1754.

A red ball floats on top of the gasoline in the tubs of a new sight gauge for automobile tanks to facilitate reading.

The Brazilian government assists in the maintenance of 96 schools in the agricultural colonies of the state of Parana.

Steel truss poles rolled from single pieces of metal have been invented for electric lights and other similar purposes.

Four mirrors distribute the light evenly and prevent glare in a new gas headlight for automobiles of English invention.

Economy is claimed for an electric heater to be inserted in range boilers as the water absorbs all the heat it radiates.

A Swedish syndicate is planning to distill alcohol spirit from white moss, there being enormous quantities of it available.

An inventor has equipped a parachute with hand operated propellers on the theory that a user can guide his descent thereby.

Swiss iron ore deposits abandoned more than 40 years ago as unprofitable again are to be developed with modern mining methods.

For the use of police a finger print camera has been invented that can be operated by men without expert knowledge of photography.

Experiments by American experts are showing that the isthmus of Tehuantepec is one of the best places in the world for bee culture.

A combination storm and glare shield that can be clamped on an automobile wind shield in front of a driver's seat has been invented.

Experts who have investigated the British owned beds or iron ore in Spitzbergen declare them without exception the largest in Europe.

Tests developed by the United States bureau of stands turn manila fibres in ropes one color and inferior materials different hues.

An automatic train control system that produces audible signals in locomotive cabs is being tested by a large British railroad for general use.

The inventor of a safety razor featured by a roller claims the latter gives the blade the correct motion and massages the face at the same time.

Three motorcycles used for hauling trucks in a Honolulu cannery are doing work that formerly required 24 men at less than one tenth of the cost.

When a new player piano is to be played mechanically the entire keyboard is raised slightly and the controls operated through six of the black keys.

Jointed street lamp posts, the upper sections of which can be lowered for trimming lights without the use of a ladder, have been invented in Europe.

A new cork puller looks like a pair of scissors, the loops of the handles parting to spread the points after the latter are inserted through a cork.

To permit a woman's hands to be free to arrange her hair a mirror has been invented by a Frenchman that is supported by a bracket held in the mouth.

An attachment has been patented for revolving doors which, as a person touches the hand rails, switches current into an electric motor to rotate them.

Patents have been issued in England for a process for making high-speed steel without the use of tungsten, molybdenum, cobalt or vanadium as an alloy.

Attachments for tailors' tape lines have been invented to hold one end to a customer's collar or under his arms so that accurate measurements are taken.

For trapping burglars, an Englishman has invented mechanism that at set hours drops a person who steps in front of a safe into a pit and closes doors over him.

Perforated metal tubes, finished to resemble tree trunks, into which branches can be thrust, have been patented for building artificial trees for decorations.

The greatest hydro-electric plant in the world, planned for India, is expected to deliver water to the turbines at a pressure of 680 pounds to the square inch.

Long, slender sand bags have been designed to replace Indian clubs and dumb-bells in gymnasiums, their weight being adjustable, besides which they are noiseless.

Ever since the founding of the Pasteur Institute in Paris there has been a steady decline in the number of hydrophobia cases, none at all occurring in some years.

A new electric washing machine is featured by an elliptical tub that revolves and tosses the water and clothing about, corrugations and rubbing surfaces being omitted.

Finland's mineral deposits, long known but unexploited, will be thoroughly studied by an organization recently formed at Helsingfors and surveys will be made for several years.

A rack in which theatre or restaurant patrons can leave their cigars when they enter with the assurance that they can be obtained again, clean and intact has been designed.

After lengthy experimenting New Zealand government chemists have succeeded in separating dirt from kauri gum and increasing its yield of oil, largely used in varnish making.

Bellows enclosed in an electric flash light by a Connecticut inventor automatically cut off the current a minute after it has been switched on to save exhausting the battery.

Acetylene is expected to come into general use for lighting in Denmark as the government has named a commission to pass upon lamps sold and carbide is easily obtained from Norway.

For motor trucks a fender has been invented that is so mounted on springs as to lessen the shock to persons it may happen to strike and to push them away from in front of the wheels.

First suggested more than 200 years ago, the plan of building a canal to give Paris direct communication with the English channel at Dieppe again is receiving serious consideration.

An auxiliary reservoir, carried at a slightly greater height than the barrel of the pen, assures a steady flow of ink to a new fountain pen which, however, cannot be carried in a pocket.

Although it costs but six cents a day in India for men to wear fans to keep the air circulating in houses, they are gradually being replaced by electric fans as cheaper and more reliable.

To take up asphalt paving between street car rails a California man has invented a sort of scoop that can be mounted in front of a car, into which the asphalt is almost automatically loaded.
