

We are taking the liberty of criticising a statement , which appeared in your last article on housing, inasmuch as it reflects unfavorably upon the dealers in builders' supplies. In this article, you referred to two Englishmen who recently came to Kingston to carry on some building opera-

These parties, you stated, could btain their material outside the city for fifty per cent., or in other words, just one-half of what it would cost them to purchase the same within the city. If this statement be true, plies are guilty of a charge of profiteering. We feel that in justice to ourselves, it behooves us to make a statement on this point inasmuch as some people may jump at a conclusion that such is the case. Leaving aside the question of the

heavy expenses involved in carrying a stock of builders' supplies, in keeping a staff of clerks, salespeople and laborers to handle goods; in paying insurance, taxes, advertising and many other items incidental to a business of this kind, we wish make a statement that it is impossible to buy builders' supplies at the present day, at fifty per cent, under the prices at which they are being sold in this city. It is not necessary to state here how much profit the merchant, in these goods, may have. It is sufficient to remark that your! statement is grossly exaggerated. It is quite possible that one may be able to purchase a certain class! of goods at fifty per cent, less than


