**FOUGHT HUN PROPAGANDA**

**DR. G. H. GIRDWOOD FOUGHT THE HUNS IN INDIA.**

Filmed "With the Empire's Fighters" and Showed the India Natives Scenes Photographed Among the Indian Troops in France.

Dr. D. H. Girdwood with his splendid war film, "With the Empire's Fighters," attracted another packed house in the Grand Opera House on Tuesday evening, and those present were not slow in expressing their appreciation of this loyal Canadian, who risked so much to try and show in an undeniable way the work that the British army was doing in France during the war, which has just closed.

When the war started Dr. Girdwood was in India working on a commission for the India Government to put in an entirely new and better set of books into the public schools. This work has not been completed yet and the doctor is still engaged in it.

His intimacy with the conditions in India and his knowledge of Germany made him see the effects of German propaganda on the natives of India, and when newspaper publicity failed to combat the evil he volunteered to go to France, take moving pictures of the actual conditions and then show the natives the lies of the Hun propaganda. The film was a tremendous success, and Dr. Girdwood was commended for his work by several high officials of India and Great Britain.

In selecting Kingston as the second Canadian place in which the film is shown, Dr. Girdwood paid the local theatre-goers a deep compliment, and the capacity houses which have been greeting his production show that his work is deeply appreciated.

It is interesting to note that Dr. Girdwood is a Canadian, having been born near Woodstock. During recent years he has, however, been travelling around the world, and this is his first visit to Ontario in some years.

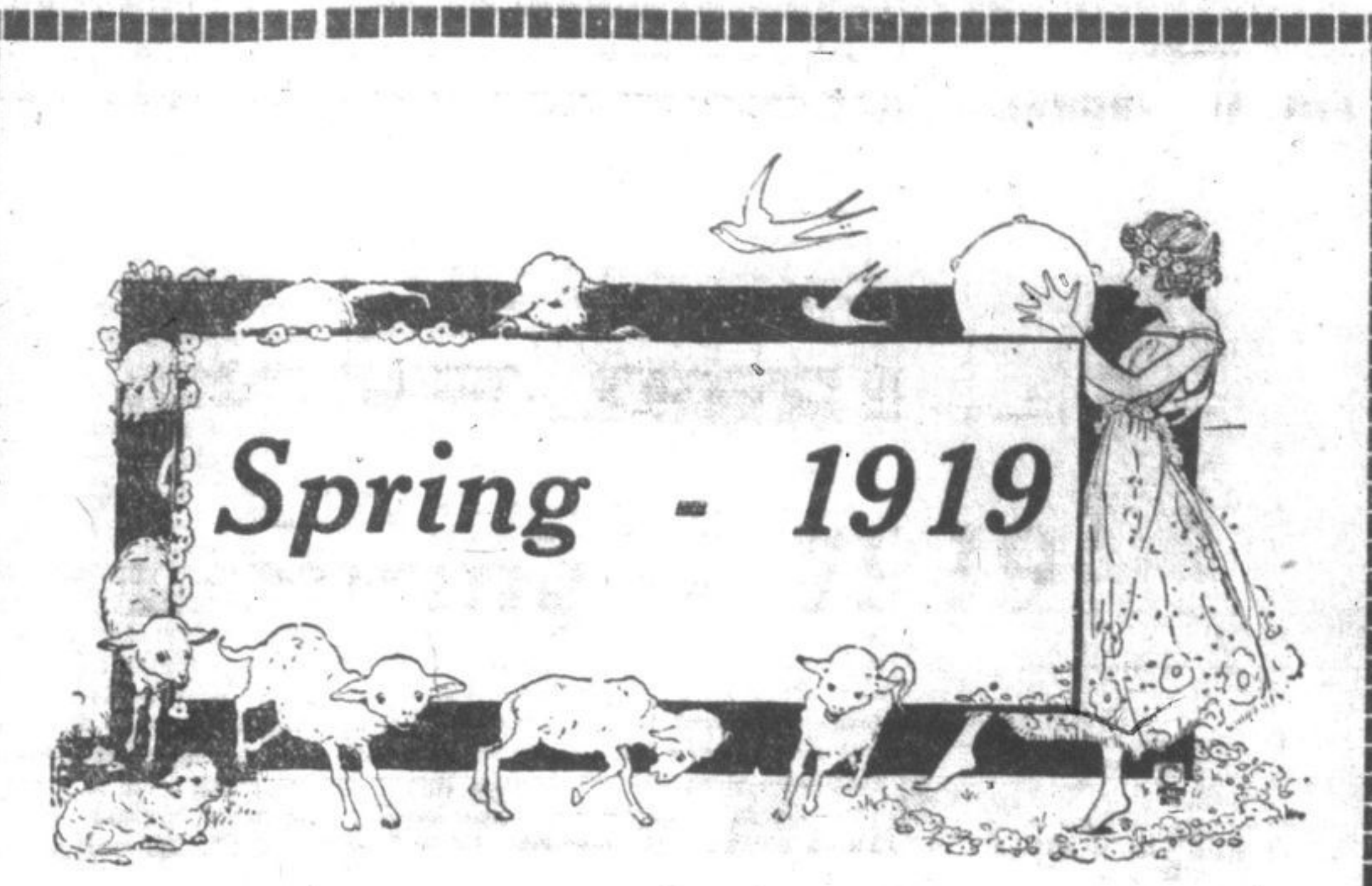
