TWO NEW SCHOOL FAIRS

DISTRICT AGRICULTURAL REPRESENTATIVE MAKES PLANS.

Estimates That There Will Be 4000 Pupils in the County Competing in the School Fairs This Year.

A. W. Sirette, district agricultural representative is now making arrangements for the 1919 school fairs and this year estimates that there will be over 4000 pupils in this county making applications for seeds or material to start a school fair garden, so that when the fairs are held in the fall they will be contestants for the prizes offered.

This year Mr. Sirette will have school fairs held at Piccadilly and Sharbot Lake, in addition to those usually held, and these two new ventures will be open for about ten schools each.

Last year there were ninety-six schools with pupils competing and this year there will be 110. There will probably be about 1000 more pupils thus benefited.

The school fairs since being started a few years ago have done a tremendous amount of good in helping "greater production" and as the residents become better acquainted with their work and objects the work is growing.

Each pupil has the opportunity of securing two of the different items selected by Mr. Sirette, who furnishes the material to start the work. In the fall the results are exhibited at the school fairs and competent judges determine who has been the most successful in utilizing the material.

The list of things which may be grown has been extended this year and a bigger variety is offered. The list is as follows:

RECOMMEND BONUS TO FIRE BRIGADE

Fire and Light Committee Suggests Bonus Schedule For This Year.

At a meeting of the civic fire and light committee on Wednesday evening, it was decided, on motion of Ald. White, to recommend the following bonuses to the fire chief, captains and men for this year, owing to the increased cost of living: Chief \$100 per year; captains each \$6 a month; third and fourth-year men, \$4 a month; second-year men \$3 a month; first-year men, \$2 a month. This will mean an increase in wages of \$892.

The committee recommended that the demobilization huts at Barriefield be given fire protection under the same conditions as given the Royal Military College.

NATURAL RINKS FORMED.

Victoria Park is a Big Sheet of Ice and Attracts Hundreds.

The weather this winter has made several natural rinks in various parts of the city and almost every person has had an opportunity to skate without going far from home.

There is a splendid big rink in Victoria Park, caused by the alternate spells of warm and cold weather, and a person can now skate almost completely around the park circle.

Another very popular natural rink has formed near the city water tower and there is almost an acre of ice. Caton's pasture has been very good, and lots all over the city have become skating surfaces, and old residents are remarking that this has seldom if ever happened before.

Will Test Workmanship of Garage Before Settling Suit.

Before deciding as to the workmanship on Angrove's garage, Justice Logie, who heard evidence in the Kingston Construction Co. vs. Angrove Bros. action, adjourned the case until a test could be made of the building. On Wednesday afternoon Justice Logie, with the principals and the counsel, paid a visit to the building, and after the court resumed this decision was made.

JUSTICE LOGIE HONORED.

Tendered Informal Dinner at Frontenac Club by Judge Lavell.

On Wednesday evening, Judge H. A. Lavell entertained at an informal dinner at the Frontenac Club, Justice Logie, Principal Bruce Taylor, Brig-Gen. C. N. Perreau, J. L. Whiting, K.C., E. King and J. M. Farwell.

The dinner was held as a recognition of the first judicial visit to the city of Justice Logie, who has been connected with Kingston in many ways, but never as a supreme court justice sitting here. Justice Logie is a Queen's University graduate, and has been a member of the board of trustees of the university for years.

WOOD CASE HEARD.

Judge Lavell Dismissed Suit for \$800 of Swift & Co.

Judgment was handed down on Thursday by Judge Lavell in an action brought by James Swift & Co. against James Campbell, of Ormsby, heard in special sessions of the County Court. The suit for \$800 damages for breach of contract to deliver wood in 1917. The contract was by correspondence.

The judge dismissed the action with costs, holding that the defendant was not bound to furnish any specific quantity of wood and consequently not liable for non-delivery.
