

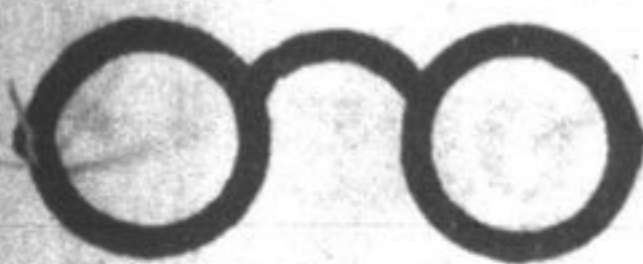

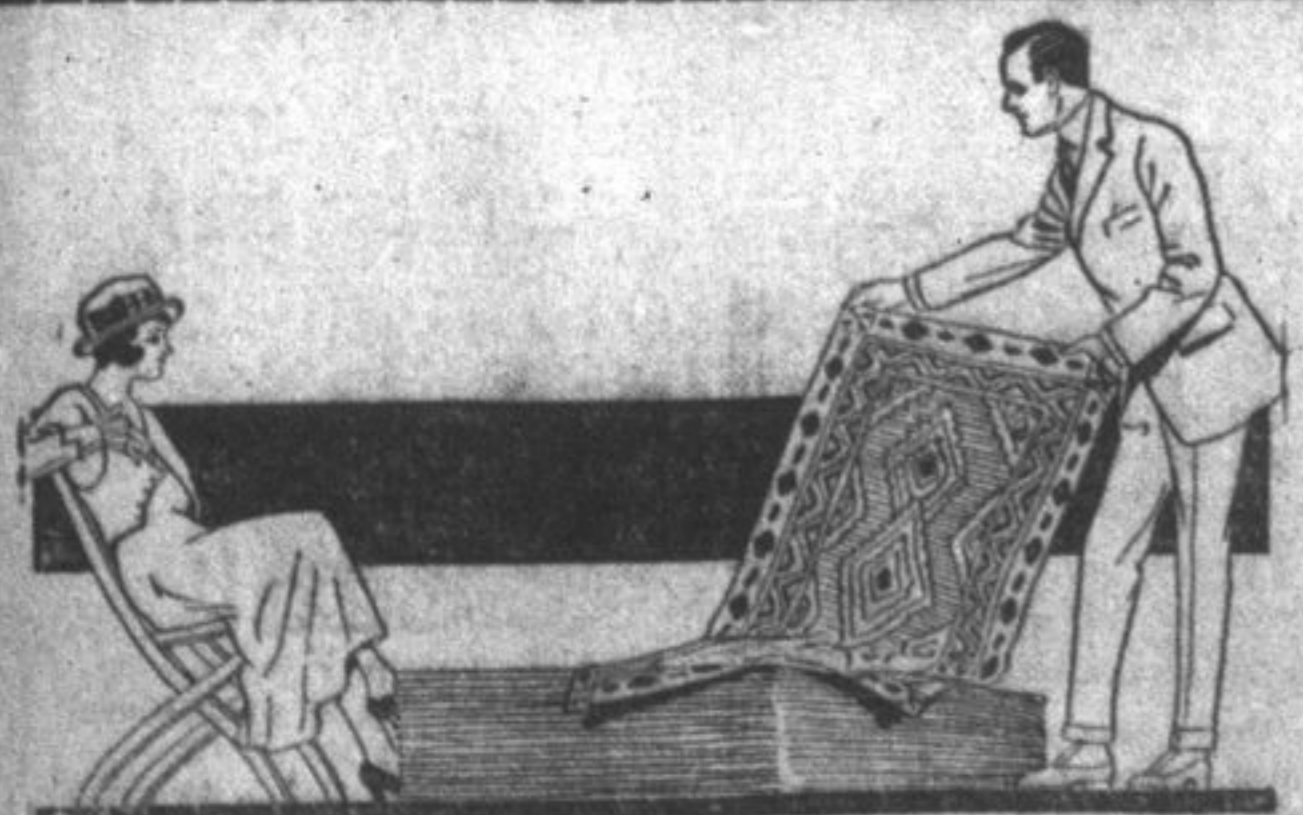

CONDITIONS IN KINGSTON

REGARDING RELIGIOUS EDUCATION NOT SATISFACTORY.

Statement Made At Sunday School Conference—Boys and Girls the Only Hope of Democracy of Future.

The Sunday school conference was continued on Wednesday afternoon and concluded in the evening. The proceedings were marked by a keen desire to make the organization most efficient and place it upon a permanent basis. The attendance at the meetings was large, and the addresses given by Rev. C. A. Myers and Rev. T. A. Halpenny, of Toronto, were very inspiring. There was manifested a profound sense of responsibility to God, to the church and to society for the souls and bodies of the rising generation. The problem of the religious education and training of boys and girls was recognized and the best methods of achieving the desired result were clearly defined, and a programme was adopted calling for devoted efforts on the part of those engaged in the Sunday school work in the city. Selkirk has a similar gathering being marked by greater enthusiasm.

During the afternoon session Rev. Mr. Halpenny emphasized the great value of the conference and the production of the reports of the various departments. Speaking of the rights of the child, he declared it to be the child's absolute right to be kept from ever going away from God.

At the conclusion of Mr. Halpenny's address an adjournment took place and conferences of the different divisions were held. Mr. Myers presided over the young people's division, Mr. Halpenny the adult division and Mrs. Jackson the children's division.

A supper session was held in the church at 6.30, a denominational meeting at 7.15 and the public meeting at 8 o'clock.

Rev. Mr. Myers spoke on the Sunday school in reconstruction. The great war of the past three years was fought that we might have a better world politically and socially. Will the world be better now that the times are favourable? The people are to determine how the spirit is to be ruled in future and whether the Government is good or bad will depend upon the people. There has been dissatisfaction here in Canada and we now look for guarantees that the people are to be the ruler. The reconstruction will not amount to anything unless the people acknowledge God as father. If only 10 per cent of the people hold all the wealth, the world needs reconstructing industrially and denounced child labor.

We are proud of our educational system, but the system is not perfect. Every child should have a chance to get a thorough education to become an intelligent citizen. The failure of the German system was a moral failure by the breaking down of her religion. But education was not in itself a guarantee of peace. The college graduate of Germany was a greater menace to civilization than the savage. The one great reconstruction needed is that of man, and unless we accomplish this we are to face with the tragedy of failure. All things are easy but to make man good. It is a hard thing to change man. If the world is to be made better we have got to get better people. This is possible only with God. It is a fact that very few men become converted, and the church's most valuable work must therefore be found in moulding the character of its young people. This made the Sunday school proposition the most important of all. He saw no hope until we got back to the child, to the religious education of the boys and girls. This must be faced as a great national task. The speaker concluded with an appeal for the support of a national programme which required one man teacher for every ten boys and one woman teacher for every ten girls. The conditions in Kingston are not satisfactory in the religious education of boys and girls. At the conclusion of the address, Mayor Newman presented the financial report, and Rev. W. T. G. Brown reported on the co-operative summer schools. There was a good attendance at the classes from the city, but outside points were not well represented as had been hoped for. The teachers provided were the best, and Dean Coleman rendered valuable service. He also spoke highly of the work of Dr. Mary McKenzie.

Rev. Mr. Halpenny was the next speaker. He said that the boys and girls were the only hope of the democracy of the future. When boys and girls have Christ for their guide all problems disappear as mist before our eyes. The whole success of the work depended upon the attitude taken toward it. The officers elected are: E. P. Jenkins, president; D. A. Shaw, vice-president; William Gill, secretary-treasurer; Miss Laura Neish, elementary department; Mrs. Benjamin Miller, girls' section; P. Newman, boys' section; Dr. E. Lake, adult section; Mrs. N. Spooner, home department; J. K. Carroll, mission department; G. R. Smith, teacher training; J. Laidlaw, temperance.

Mr. Jenkins, the new president, thanked all for the expression of confidence, and hoped to make the year one of great results.

The Children of Mary, of which Miss I. Roman is president, held a tea and sale followed by euchre party in the Knights of Columbus hall on Wednesday.

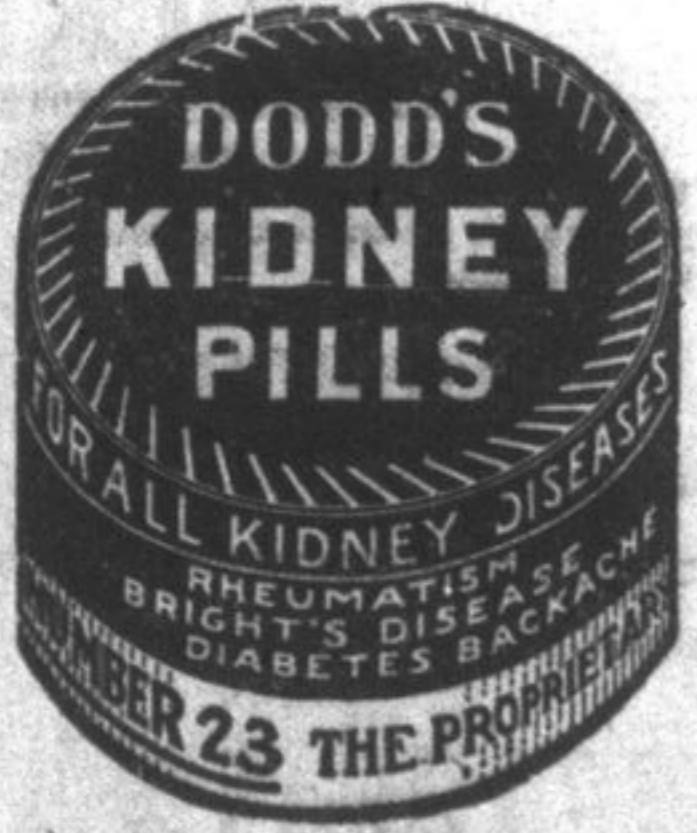
