OLIVE BRANCH EXTENDED

BY D. D. MACKENZIE TO THE LIBERAL UNIONISTS.

"Latch String Out," the New Leader Says—What Sir Thomas White Had to Say in Reply.

Ottawa, Feb. 27.—Indications of the plans and policies of both Government and Opposition for the session now beginning were given in the House of Commons. Both House leaders were heard. D. D. MacKenzie, of North Cape Breton, made his debut as temporary leader of the opposition. Sir Thomas White spoke as acting Prime Minister, and familiarly expressed the hope that "unaccustomed and temporary responsibility may make us wondrous kind."

Mr. MacKenzie plainly indicated that he and his committee of management had already reached conclusions with regard to some of the legislation promised in the Speech from the Throne. He suggested that there is need for expedition on the part of the Government in dealing with the problems attendant upon the demobilization of the military forces and industrial reconstruction. "There is one attribute of the divine about this Government," he said. "To it one day is as a thousand years and a thousand years as one day." He intimated that the Opposition would be opposed to provision for special voters' lists for Dominion elections by the promised franchise bill, and would prefer utilization of provincial lists as in the years before 1917. He did not think further federal legislation to confer the franchise upon women necessary, inasmuch as most of the provinces had already granted women the right to vote. He contended that expenditures upon highways came within the ambit of provincial jurisdiction, and Parliament should leave road construction and improvement to the provincial Governments and Legislatures. He objected to the duplication of machinery by the establishment of a federal Department of Health, but he asserted that a contribution by the Dominion Parliament to increase facilities for vocational training would be with no objections from the Opposition provided the money be disbursed under proper conditions. Speaking of his own position, he announced his intention of following the footsteps of the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Holds Out Olive Branch.
"For the benefit of Liberal Unionists," he concluded, "let me tell my friends that the war is over; the light is in the window for you; the latch string is out and you are always welcome."

"I am inclined to think," said Sir Thomas White, referring to the olive branch thus displayed by the Opposition leader, "that the people of this country are not thinking much of party politics. The questions we have to consider are so vast, and so important that matters which used to interest us, take a second place. When the ship of state, after the storm through which it has passed, is once more equipped and sails again into smooth seas it will be time to consider the old party situations which used to engage our attention." While the acting premier realized the magnitude and importance of the problems to be solved, he faced them confidently. "I think that this people can meet with confidence and with faith whatever vicissitudes the future may hold in store for it," he said. Sir Thomas retorted the action already taken by the Government to bridge and period of industrial dislocation which might mark the transition from war to peace conditions. The estimates, he announced, would contain an item of \$35,000,000 for steel rails, rolling stock, and other railway equipment, more than \$20,000,000 for extensions on the Canadian National Railway System, and more than \$10,000,000 for railway betterments. He told of the Government's intention to carry out a programme of construction of necessary public works.

He discussed the reasons in favor of federal aid for highway construction. As to the proposed franchise bill, he pointed out that the War Time Election Act of 1917 was intended to continue operative during the war and the period of demobilization. It would have to remain on the statute book until a satisfactory franchise act is passed to take its place.

UNEARTH A POISON PLOT.

Conspiracy to Poison Soldiers on British Transports.
San Francisco, Cal., Feb. 27.—Poison placed in bottles of soda water caused the sudden deaths of six on Jan. 3rd of Dr. John Grimm, surgeon of the Union Steamship Company's liner Moana, and Miss Nellie Isbester, formerly of Berkeley, Cal., while the steamer was en route from San Francisco to Wellington, N.Z. It was learned here when the Moana arrived from the Antipodes. Capt. Barlow, master of the steamer, said that the Wellington military authorities were investigating a suspected conspiracy which was directed at the wholesale poisoning of troops aboard British transports and that arrests were expected. A civilian inquest exonerated every person aboard the Moana, Capt. Barlow said. The bodies of Dr. Grimm and Miss Isbester were buried at sea.

Mayor Loses Son.
Cornwall, Feb. 26.—A. C. Fetterly, mayor of Cornwall, was notified yesterday by the director of records, Ottawa, that his eldest son, Acting Sergt. William Marius Grant Fetterly, was officially reported died of pneumonia at the Canadian Hospital, Bramshott, England, Feb. 19th.

The executive committee of the Miners' Federation placed before the delegates a recommendation that the offer of the British Government commission to inquire into the situation, be accepted.
