\$15,000 ASKED FROM CANADA

In Order, to Aid the Canadian Chaplain Services Overseas.

A MOST WORTHY APPEAL

BISHOP BIDWELL EXPLAINS THE OBJECT OF IT.

The Money Is Needed For the Keep of Soldiers' Wives and Children at Buxton When Steamer Sailing Is Delayed.

The director of chaplain services in England (Col. the Rev. Canon Almond) has cabled to Canada, for \$15,000 for immediate needs in the social department of their work. The Bishop of Ontario, who has just returned from England, was asked by Col. Almond to explain publicly just what this pressing need was. The wives and families of men returning to Canada from the front are notified to join their husbands at Buxton in order to accompany them to Liverpool for embarkation to Canada. Sometimes the departure of the boat is delayed, and in consequence the men have to remain some time at Buxton after the arrival of their wives and families. There is no provision for the housing or care of the women and children during the delay. Col. Almond thought that this was the kind of work the chaplain's service should handle, so he took over a large building at Buxton and made arrangements at once for the care of these women and children. He estimated the outlay at \$15,000.

The chaplain's services include all religious denominations, so there should be no difficulty in raising the money. The Bishop of Ontario can only speak for the Anglican church, which is asked to contribute \$4,500. Subscriptions from members of that church should be sent without delay to the editor of the Canadian Churchman, Continental Life Building, Toronto. No doubt arrangements will be made by the churches for receiving subscriptions. One who believes in practical Christianity will heartily commend Col. Almond's action and show him by their liberal support that his faith in the generosity of the members of the Canadian churches was not misplaced. At any rate, the work is being done and the churches are committed to it.

Military Matters

Capt. J. H. Macdonald, formerly of the R.C.H.A., is at present adjutant of the 1st A.D.C., 1st Canadian Division, France.

Siberian troops from Victoria, B.C., are expected to reach Kingston by C.P.R. on Thursday and Saturday.

Brig.-Gen. Victor Williams, G.O.C. M.D. No. 3, has asked the mayor for information respecting the proposed reception to the soldiers returning from overseas in units. Gen. Williams is anxious to meet the wishes of the citizens in arranging for the most fitting welcome to the boys, and as the change in the method of their return will require a change in the civic procedure, the mayor has been asked for his views.

A board of officers, with Lieut.-Col. G. H. Gillespie, president, has been appointed for the purpose of investigating damages to property at the former nurses' home in the County Court House.

Captain Williams, officer commanding the army medical training depot, is winding up that unit under the general demobilization order and the Toy building will be vacated. The building has during the war been used as barracks for the infantry school, headquarters for the 1st Depot Battalion E.O.R., and the A.M.C. depot.

The S.S. Megantic, which docked at Halifax Wednesday, has four officers and 117 other ranks for M.D. No. 2.

The City Council at Ottawa voted \$500 to be used for the reception and entertainment of returning soldiers. Mayor Newman is being asked what he is going to do in the way of a reception for our returning fighters.

It is stated that when the case of ex-Sergt. S. J. Withey is heard in police court on Monday there will be several facts brought out which will show that the matter is much more serious than at first thought and it is possible that others are involved.

The men of "C" Battery, R.C.H.A., are now being paid direct by the district paymaster, pending some system being found which will prevent a re-occurrence of the trouble with which Withey is charged.

No word has yet been received as to when the R.C.H.A. brigade overseas will be embarking for Canada, but it is reported that the brigade is waiting in England for sailing orders.

The Militia Department has received a cable stating that the Princess Pats Regiment sailed for Canada on March 5th, with approximately thirty-two officers and 525 other ranks.

The debate on the speech from Nearly 500,000 bushels of superior quality Ontario oats have been shipped to the western provinces for seed purposes.

ATTENDED WOUNDED UNDER HEAVY FIRE

The Details of the Feat For Which Capt. Halkett Was Decorated.

How Capt. Norman McLeod Halkett, medical officer of the 28th Royal Ottawa Battalion, won the Military Cross is described in the London Times of Feb. 7th:

Capt. N. McL. Halkett, Can. A.M.C., attd. 38th Bn., Can. Infy., E. Ont. R.—For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during operations against the Drocourt-Queant line near Drury between Sept. 1-3, 1918. Near Vis-en-Artois, the area in which the regimental aid post was located, was persistently searched by enemy artillery, causing many casualties. He attended to the wounded in the open, in spite of heavy shelling. Later, the regimental aid post was established in an open trench, and he again carried on under severe shell fire, with unflinching energy and utter disregard for his own personal safety.

Capt. Halkett is the son of J. B. Halkett, Ottawa, lately of Kingston. He went overseas as medical officer of the 77th Battalion, and was transferred to the 38th Battalion.
