BRITAIN ORDERS BACON. Packers Will Have Ten Thousand Tons Placed With Them. Ottawa, March 4.—The situation in regard to the packing industry in Canada, particularly bacon, is greatly cleared by the announcement today that the British Government has decided to place with Canadian packers contracts for ten thousand tons of bacon. It will be recalled that some weeks ago orders ceased and an embargo on such imports was established. The serious effect upon the packing and stock raising industry was impressed on the government and there have been negotiations since then to re-establish the trade. It is now announced that orders to the extent mentioned are being placed and that the restrictions are expected to be removed about March 31st. The open market will be established, but Canada will likely benefit from the fact that the Englishman prefers Canadian to American bacon. The situation with regard to beef is not so favorable, but Live Stock Commissioner Arkell is now over there and prospects are good for substantial orders from France anyway. The orders for bacon are being placed among the packers pro rata on the quantity offered, and a prominent man in the trade said today that the 10,000 tons contract will absorb about two-thirds of all stocks on hand.

Increase Production: Maintain Wages

Half a million war veterans and war workers must be re-established in civil pursuits. Between 1,500,000 and 2,000,000 people, out of a total population of 8,000,000, are affected vitally by the cessation of hostilities. If Canada is to escape unemployment, unrest and depression, agricultural and industrial production must be maintained and increased.

"Wealth lies in production," Lloyd George has told the British people, "and production can be enormously increased." "Unemployment is due to underconsumption," says the Reconstruction Committee of the American Federation of Labor. "Underconsumption is caused by low or insufficient wages. Give the workers just wages and their consuming capacity is correspondingly increased. A man's ability to consume is controlled by the wages received. Just wages will create a market at home which will far surpass any market that may exist elsewhere, will prevent industrial stagnation, and lessen periodical unemployment."

The Canadian Reconstruction Association believes that increased production is essential to national prosperity and that good wages ensure efficient labor, the maximum of production, and the most extensive development of the home market.

WHO SHOULD FILE RETURNS. 1. Every unmarried person or widow or widower, without dependent children under twenty-one years of age, who during calendar year 1918 received or earned \$1,000 or more. 2. All other individuals who during calendar year 1918 received or earned \$2,000 or more. 3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$3,000, during the fiscal year ended in 1918. FORMS TO BE FILLED IN AND FILED. FORM T1. By individuals, other than farmers and ranchers. FORM T1A. By farmers and ranchers. FORM T2. By corporations and joint stock companies. FORM T3. By trustees, executors, administrators of estates and assignees. FORM T4. By employers to make return of the names of all directors, officials, agents or other employees to whom was paid \$1,000 or more in salaries, bonuses, commission or other remuneration during the calendar year 1918. FORM T5. By corporations, joint stock companies, associations and syndicates to make return of all dividends and bonuses paid to shareholders and members during 1918.
