**LADY'S DRESS WAS STOLEN**

"MOVING DAY" BROUGHT ABOUT TROUBLE.

Missing Dress Was Found in Second-hand Store, and Owen Thompson, Accused of Stealing It, is Now in Custody.

"Moving day," as a rule, brings trouble enough for the housewife in getting the hundred and one things packed up, but this day of all days, which was observed recently by a Kingston lady, brought far more than its usual share of trouble, for in the transfer of goods and chattels from one home to another the lady's best "Sunday dress" was reported missing. It was at first thought that a careless driver had let it fall off the load. A thorough search was made, but the dress, a very pretty one, and valued at \$40, could not be found. Then it was thought that the dress had been stolen. The police were notified, and given a description of the dress, and every man on the police force was instructed to keep their weather eye open for it. The "cops" looked at dresses until they could see nothing else but dresses. They hunted for it day and night, in fact they dreamed about it by night; some could not sleep for thinking about how mean a person must be to steal a lady's dress. Every woman was given the "once over" as she passed along the street. But in spite of all this work of the Sherlock Homes character, the missing dress could not be found.

But then something happened, and it fell to the lot of Sergeant Samuel Arnel to spot the dress. Making a visit to one of the local second-hand stores, his eagle eye caught a dress that tallied with the one reported stolen. He immediately got busy, with the result that the dress was identified as the one missing, and was removed to the police station.

Then a description was secured of the man who sold the dress, and it was not long before Constable James Downey had the man who is alleged to have made the sale. Owen Thompson, a young man, who has been in trouble with the police before, was taken in charge, accused of stealing the dress and disposing of it, and he will come up for trial on Monday. Although valued at \$40, it is alleged that Thompson got the pretty sum of \$2.50 from the second-hand dealer. The dress was practically new, as the owner had only worn it a few times. It appears that the accused was one of the men who helped move the household goods on "moving day."

Corpl. Russel Thurston enlisted in Feb., 1916, with the Canadian Grenadier Guards. Being unable to go over with that Battalion, he was transferred to the 66th Battery, Canadian Field Artillery, going overseas as gunner to complete his training in England. He went to France early in 1917, where he was promoted corporal on the field, where he was on active service until he received his wound on Nov. 6th, 1918. He had advanced all the way to the city of Valenciennes. He was sent to the English hospital at Burton, where he is now awaiting his turn for home in Lavant, Ont.
