JAIL FOR DRESS THIEF

OWEN THOMPSON IS SENTENCED TO THREE MONTHS.

Three youths corralled in connection with store robbery last December, and remanded—Forgery Case Again Enlarged.

Owen Thompson, a smart-looking chap, twenty-seven years old, will not steal a dress again—least not for three months at any rate. Magistrate Farrell sent him to jail for that period, in the police court on Monday morning, when he pleaded guilty to stealing a lady's dress. Sergt. Samuel Armiel found the dress in a local second-hand store, where Thompson had disposed of it for \$2.50, and Police Constable James Downey landed the prisoner, who has quite a police court record.

An echo of an old robbery was heard when a youth was charged with stealing a watch, rings and buttons from the store of Louis Abramson. He pleaded "not guilty" to the charge, stating that the things had been given to him. Remanded for a week.

WADING THROUGH WATER.
