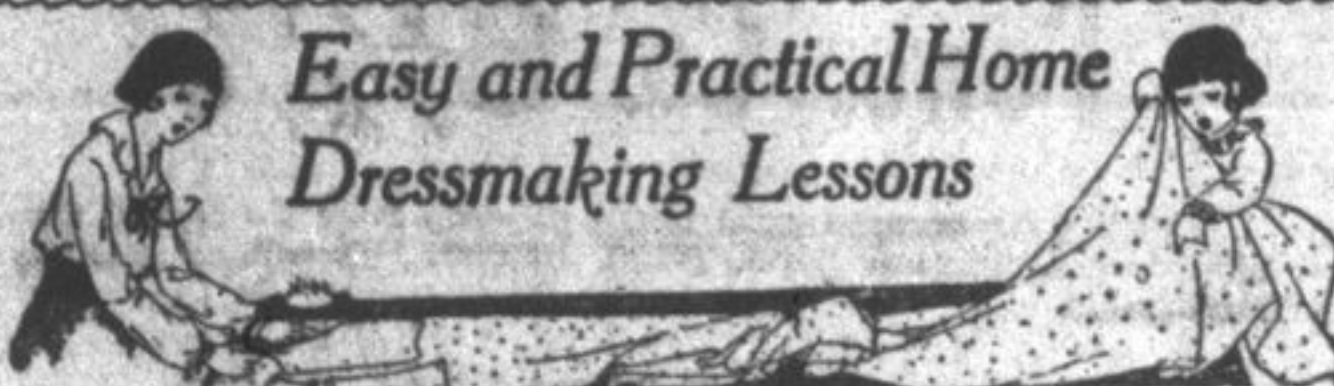

Skirt with One-Piece Tunic.



inch material, with 1 1/4 yards 36-inch lining for the upper part.
As the guide shows, the construction of the skirt is exceedingly simple. First, join the corners as notched, leaving left side seam free above the lower large "O" perforation in front gore. Finish the edges above the perforation for a placket. Pin back gore, placing "T" on corresponding small "o" perforations and tack.
Next, adjust the stay to position underneath the skirt, with upper and left side edges even and stitch upper edges together. Now, take the tunic and find the center front indicated by large "O" perforations. The small "oo" perforations indicate the center-back. Form plait at center-front placing the slot perforation on the large "O" perforation. Form remaining small "oo" perforations; tack all plaits. Turn the left side edge of tunic under on line of slot perforations. Adjust the tunic to position on the skirt with center-fronts, center-backs upper and left side edges even. Lap the right side of tunic on the left. (at the back) bringing the folded edge of hem to center-back. (indicated by double small "oo" perforation on left side) and stitch upper edges of skirt and tunic together.
Gather girls between "T" perforations, arrange around the waist with upper edge of girde 1/2 inch above the top of skirt and close at left side. The skirt is very dressy in effect and worn with a fancy waist easily constitutes informal dress.

The first models in separate skirts for advanced Fall wear are making their appearance and charming indeed are they. Here is a two-piece effect suitable to development in gabardine, jersey, tricotee or serge. The back is laid in plaits and the waistline is two inches above normal. The skirt closes at the left side and has a draped tunic with straight lower edge. If desired the girde, which also closes at the left side, may be of velvet, in self-color. In medium sizes the skirt requires 2 3/4 yards 44-inch material.
