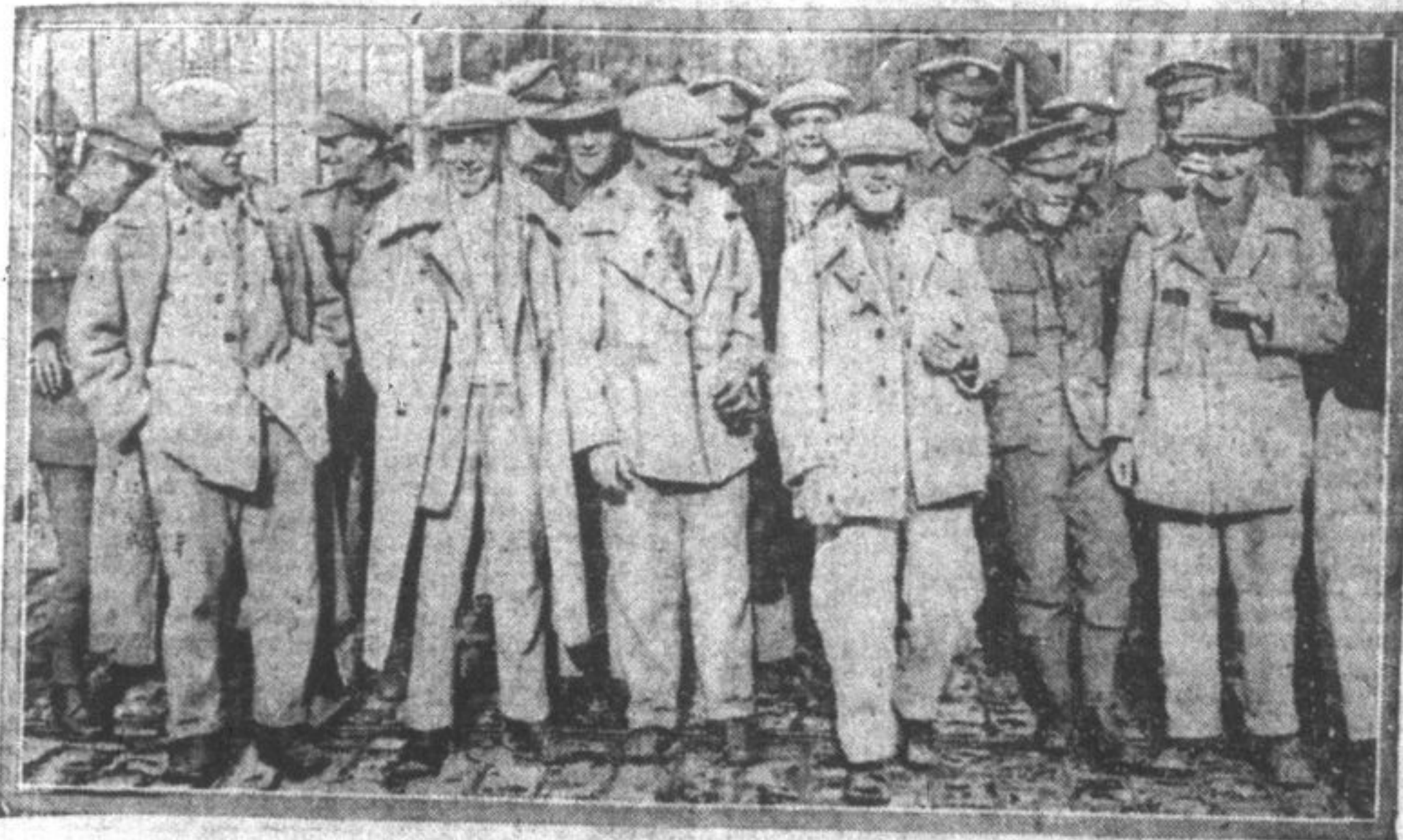

War-Savings Stamps cost \$4.02 in March; \$4.03 in April; \$4.04 in May, and they may be purchased at any place displaying the Beaver-Triangle sign.
