NO CAPITAL SHIPS.

Are to Be Built By Great Britain This Year.

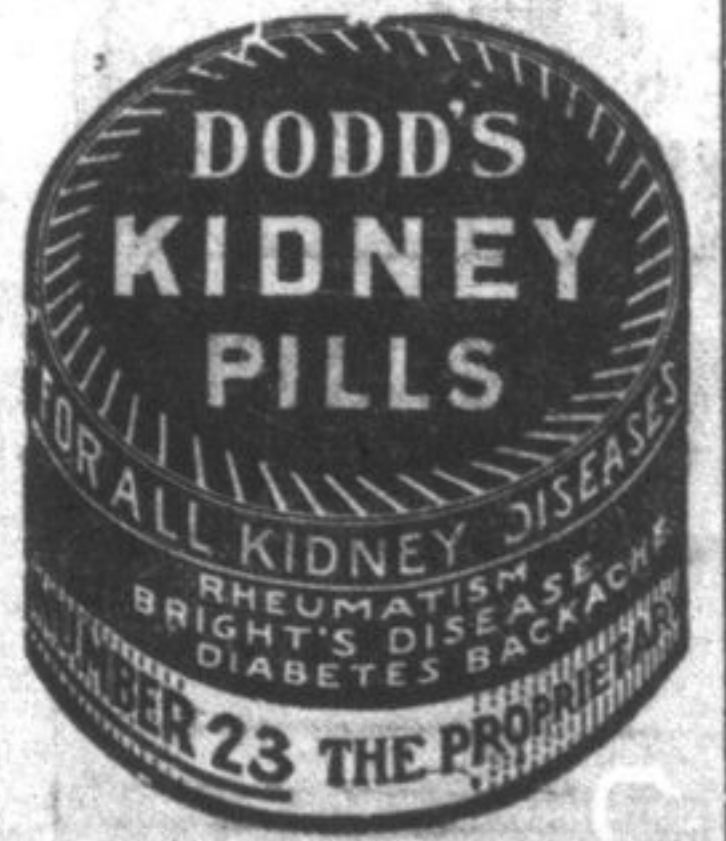
(Canadian Press Despatch.) London, March 13.—Replying to a question in the Commons last night Thomas J. MacNamara, parliamentary secretary to the Admiralty, said that no dreadnaught battleships were under construction on December 31st last. The dreadnaught battle cruiser under construction had been abandoned and the slips reed for merchant ship construction. On the same date, he said, Great Britain had thirty-three dreadnaught battleships and nine dreadnaught battle cruisers, all of which were in commission except two. So far as he knew, no capital ships will be laid down this year.

"A CRUDE JOKE."

Is Willard's Comment on "Jack" Johnson's Statement.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Lawrence, Kas., March 13.—"Jack" Johnson simply needs money and is trying to put over another match," was the comment of Jess Willard, when shown the statement received from Havana today in which Jackson claimed the championship bout with Willard four years ago was a pre-arranged affair. "There is absolutely nothing to it," Willard continued. "I refuse to dignify the statement with denial, for as far as I am concerned it is simply a crude joke."

ONLY EIGHT CANADIANS KILLED IN TAKING MONS

It Was a Rearguard Action, Men of the 42nd Battalion Say.

Montreal, March 13.—In refutation of the charges that have been made that the Canadians suffered heavy casualties at Mons when they captured that historic city on the morning when the armistice was signed, members of the 42nd Battalion, which arrived here Tuesday, state that they had exactly eight men killed in that action, and that the percentage of wounded was very small. Men of the 42nd Battalion say that they were fighting a rearguard action against the Germans, and had to clean out a number of machine gun nests. It was in connection with the wiping out of these nests that the casualties occurred. The Germans at this time were steadily retreating and destroying their railways systematically behind them. The Canadians followed closely behind, cleaning up as they went along.

FIGHT WITH WILLARD FRAME-UP, SAYS JOHNSON

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Havana, March 13.—"Jack" Johnson, former heavyweight champion, in a signed statement, declares that his fight with Jess Willard, in this city four years ago, was a pre-arranged affair and that he allowed Willard to win. The former champion declares that unless Willard agrees to fight him within a reasonable time, he will claim the world's title.

OBITUARY

The Late Rev. Sister O'Hara.

Rev. Sister O'Hara passed away in Philadelphia, Pa., on March 10th, and the remains were brought to Kingston on Wednesday. The late Sister O'Hara had been in failing health during the past two years and her death was not unexpected. She was a daughter of Patrick O'Hara, Westport, and entered the Hotel Dieu monastery twenty-seven years ago. She was a very devoted nurse and was for many years in charge of the contagious department by all her patients and her sympathetic manner was appreciated and admired by all who knew her. She is survived by three sisters and five brothers, Miss Margaret and Miss Jane O'Hara of Philadelphia, Mrs. McCarthy of Mount Pleasant, Mich.; John and Martin of Philadelphia, Stephen of Smith's Falls, Thomas of Wichita, Kansas, and Patrick of Mount Pleasant. The funeral took place to St. Mary's cathedral on Thursday morning and a solemn requiem mass was celebrated by Archbishop Spratt. The sisters' choir sang the mass and libation. The funeral was largely attended. The mourners were Misses Margaret and Jane, sisters of the deceased, John and Stephen, brothers; Mr. and Mrs. McNally, of Westport, cousins. The bearers were Dr. C. E. O'Connor, Dr. William Gibson, Dr. F. J. O'Connor, Dr. L. J. Walsh and John McNally.

W.J.C.—As you were struck off the strength prior to November 11th, 1918, you are not entitled to any war service gratuity, so that you have no claim for any further payment. Doubtless on discharge you received post discharge pay, and that is the former equivalent to war service gratuity.

Sold Planes to Bolsheviks.

London, March 13.—Lient. Porten, formerly an officer in the German Aviation Service, has been tried by court-martial, according to Berlin advices, on a charge of having sold an entire park of airplanes at Vilna to the Bolsheviks for 2,000,000 marks. The airplanes were valued at 10,000,000 marks. Porten then fled to Koenigsberg and headed a conspiracy in the local Workmen's Council against the commander of the German garrison at Kovno. The plot was discovered and Porten was arrested.
