The leading thought among the British at the present moment seems to be to strip the preliminary peace terms of all unnecessary incumbrance and secure the signature of that document so that the world can begin to settle back to normal.

One of the first questions to be considered by the council of ten will be the boundary between Poland and Germany. The Polish boundary commission, as well as the general territorial commission, has virtually agreed unanimously on this boundary. While no official announcement has been made, it is known that Danzig is included in Poland and that the commissions Despatches have agreed upon the boundary which would give Poland strategic points which should make her an effective barrier between Bolshevism and western Europe.

The opportunity to visit Bailleul was due to the great kindness of Brig.-General A. E. Ross, C.B. C.M.G., who having heard me express a great desire to visit the last resting place of the late Capt. Geo. Richardson, arranged to take me there personally. We arrived rather late, the early fall night having fallen, but as there was a beautiful moon shining we were able to find our way through the silent, tomblike city, and entered what must have been at one time a very pretty cemetery. One would have thought that in common decency the Hun would have spared the last restingplace of the inhabitants of poor, stricken, war-scared Bailluel, after having as I have stated litterly ground the city into powder, but evidently "Jerry" considered that he could only show his frightfulness in a proper manner by turning his artillery on the cemetery and smashing things up a bit.
