AN APPEAL FOR PALESTINE

MADE IN THE CITY CHURCHES ON SUNDAY.

The Collection Committee Starts Work—Kingston is Expected to Contribute \$5,000.

In nearly every church on Sunday appeals were made on behalf of the distressed Jews of Palestine. Reference was made to the fact that the Holy Land has come under the immediate protection of Great Britain whose defeat of the Turks has put an end to their despotic rule over the Jewish people. Leaflets were distributed in the pews of the churches and on Saturday streamers were placed in many of the shop windows containing the words: "The Holy Land Calls for Help." The leaflet in part read:

"The Holy Land calls to you for aid. Her people are desperately hungry; they are poorly clothed, and have no homes. The hated Turk took good care to live up to his barbarous reputation, and though he has been vanquished, his destructive work still remains, and it behooves us to undo it. Won't you help? These people are crying to the world for succor, and Canada must play just as generous a part in this cause as she has in the scores of others brought to her attention by the war."

"Thank God the British have been triumphant and Jerusalem and the Holy Land have been delivered. Let us now consecrate ourselves to a completion of the task and put these people on their feet again. Won't you just think that this is your opportunity to do something of tremendous service for the people who live in the land of the Bible? They need help, so badly. There are at least 100,000 old men, women and children suffering and waiting for us to come to their aid. They have become outcasts from their own towns and villages as the result of the inhuman warfare waged by the Turk for three years."

The committee, which is under the chairmanship of J. M. Hughes, started its work this morning. A meeting was held at the city hall and the work divided up. The members are as follows:
