PALESTINE RELIEF FUND

THE CAMPAIGN EXTENDED UNTIL SATURDAY NIGHT.

Kingston Must Not Fall Down in the Effort of the Local Committee to Raise \$5,000.

Yesterday showed a slight improvement over Tuesday in the amount subscribed to the Palestine relief fund, and in the hope of getting the full amount of \$5,000 asked from Kingston a meeting of the local executive was held last night.

It was decided to extend the campaign for three days more ending Saturday night. This is done at the request of many who still intend to contribute, and it will also give the canvassers plenty of time to completely cover the district allotted to them. It will also give the ladies who are working from door to door in the residential section sufficient time to get over a great part of the city. They collected about \$100 yesterday in small amounts, and their work is deserving of great praise. The worthiness of the cause has been explained to the citizens, and the executive are anxious to raise Kingston's quota by a helping hand from all classes and creeds, in small and large amounts. WANT TO EMIGRATE.

Belgian, His Wife and Cousin Wish to Come to Canada.

That immigration from France and Belgium and other countries in the war zone will commence as soon as the authorities and conditions will permit is shown by a letter which the father of a local doctor overseas received on Wednesday. The letter mentioned three Belgians who were very anxious to come to Canada if there were any suitable commercial openings for them. One of them is the clerical head of a very large firm and his wife is a teacher in the largest public school of a city which has a population of about 9,000. A cousin of the man is superintendent of a plant "three times as big as the locomotive works," according to the letter, and the three are very anxious to emigrate.
