500 TONS OF ICE SHORT

ICE COMPANY NOT ABLE TO HARVEST USUAL AMOUNT.

The Ice Was Between Seven and Nine Inches Thick, and Easily Broken—May Have to Import. There is a possibility of Kingston having to import ice from Lake Simcoe this year to complete the summer's requirements, according to H. Small, manager of the Kingston Ice Company, but Mr. Small does not think this will be necessary unless it is an unusually warm summer. This city usually requires 14,000 tons of ice from the Kingston Ice Company. This year, owing to the very bad ice-making weather, only 13,500 tons of this was put in. The ice has been in other years up to three feet thick, but the cutters only secured ice from seven to nine inches thick this year. The quality was below the average and the breakage was very heavy. It was not thick enough or strong enough to be handled in the usual way and had to be cut smaller.

When asked as to the price this season, Mr. Small stated that he did not know whether an increase would be necessary or not. The men had to be paid more and the conditions were unusually bad for storing ice. He was sure, however, that with average summer weather there would be sufficient, particularly as there is an ice-making plant at the Mowat Hospital. There will not be any military camps at Barriefield requiring great quantities, and a number of local firms have started putting in their own supply this year for the first time. In spite of a shortage of 500 tons, there will probably be enough ice to meet the demand.

London, March 21.—Commodore Aemilius Jarvis has delivered the contribution to the British Navy League which he brought over, and is being entertained by the Navy League. Before returning to Canada, Commodore Jarvis and his son will go to St. Julien, and select a site for a monument to be erected by the Governor-General's Body Guards and the 10th Royal Grenadiers in honor of their companies in the Third Battalion who were annihilated in the second Battle of Ypres. The design of the monument is a tall square column. It will be erected on the site of those soldiers' last stand.

Largest Vote at Cape in Years. Cape Vincent, N.Y., March 21.—At the village election held on Tuesday there were 188 votes cast. This is the largest number cast here in many years. There was but one ticket in the field, both Republicans and Democrats endorsing the same candidate. On the day before the election one of the trustees started an opposition for the village presidency trying to defeat the candidate by writing in the name of another party. When this was learned a number of people voted who would probably have not done so had there been no opposition. A. Henry Bove, the regularly nominated candidate for president received 144 votes and Leonard Gates 25. The officers elected followed: President, A. Henry Bove; trustee, Adelbert Webster; treasurer, F. G. Blum; collector, Nelson Mance.
