PRESENTATION OF BARITONE SOLDIERS CLUB ROOMS

TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL GIVE A BAND INSTRUMENT.

Ald. C. J. Graham presided and introduced the labor representatives, calling on Ald. N. Smith for a speech, after the latter had presented a beautiful baritone to Bandmaster Granger. Adjutant Smith followed Bandmaster Granger in thanking the Trades and Labor Council for their kindness to the Salvation Army.

A musical programme of band selections, marches, etc., followed and in this four new instruments that had been purchased by the Christmas serenading money were used. A euphonium solo was rendered by Jack Hughes; a piccolo number by Mr. Schofield; vocal solos by Mrs. (Adjutant) Smith and Captain Foster, and a recitation by Miss Laura Williamson.

The event was very largely attended and proved one of the most enjoyable programmes given in the citadel in some time.

THE FORMAL OPENING TOOK PLACE THURSDAY EVENING—A FINE PROGRAMME GIVEN—MANY IN ATTENDANCE.

The formal opening of the soldiers' room was conducted by the Knights of Columbus Catholic Army Huts Fund, took place on Thursday evening. The assembly hall was filled by soldiers. A splendid musical programme was rendered, and addresses were given.

Before the meeting the rooms were open to inspection by the visitors, among whom were Col. Harry Genet, A.A.G. M.D. No. 3, representing headquarters; Mayor H. W. Newman, representing the civic reception committee; Capt. Frank O'Connor, Queen's Military Hospital; Lieut. J. Grady, of the Casualty Company, and the executive committee of the Knights of Columbus.

N. E. O'Connor presided at the meeting, and he extended a warm welcome to the soldiers and visitors. He stated that the club was to be regarded as a place for recreation and accommodation for returned and returning soldiers irrespective of religion, and the services of the club and its officials were to be at the soldiers' disposal so long as the need for them existed. He expressed the deepest appreciation of the service rendered by the soldiers of Canada and the Empire and our debt to them was one that we could never adequately discharge. If anything was required by the boys they had only to make their wants known to the secretary, who would do everything in his power to meet their wishes. The club would be open at all times.

The other speakers were Col. Harry Genet, Mayor Newman, and Lieut. Sanford, of the Soldiers' Aid Commission. Songs were sung by J. Fournier, Joseph McFarlane, Harold Barrett, and Master Emerson O'Connor. A step dance was given by Joseph Feaney, a violin solo by J. V. Mallen, and an overture by the orchestra. The entertainment closed with "God Save the King."
