HELGOLAND GREAT FORT

GERMANS SPENT \$10,000,000 IN ERECTING LONG-RANGE GUNS.

All Encased in Armor—Provisions For Two Years Delivered on the Very Day War Was Declared.

Correspondence London, March 13.—Heligoland, lying 40 miles north-west of the mouth of the Elbe, was a British possession from 1870 and until it was ceded to Germany in 1890, in return for concessions in East Africa.

By 1911 the plans of the Kaiser practically were completed. Equipped with \$10,000,000 worth of long-range guns, capable of sinking a hostile fleet venturing within 15 miles of the island, the fort had been encased in an armor belt of steel, concrete and granite, providing protection not only from hostile cannon, but from the onslaughts of the sea.

Garrison of 2,000 Experts. Two thousand crack artillerymen were sent to the island and ordered to make their homes there for the remainder of their lives. Once a force of gunners was well acquainted with their guns, the signals and systems their services, should Germany go to war, were worth several times the services of a force of men comparatively untrained in the art of their work.

To the south of the island a harbor was constructed in which the largest ship could come directly up to the wharves that were built. Sounding of the sea for miles around in every direction was taken, and a military cable between the island and Cuxhaven was laid on the floor of the sea.

The day war was declared two ships loaded with provisions arrived at Heligoland and were stored away. The store rooms then contained sufficient to feed and provide for the garrison during a siege of two years, should one ever be conducted against the island.

Not a single civilian—man, woman or child—was left. After the vessels had departed every person on Heligoland was a soldier, sailor or a hospital attendant. The population of the island, which numbered about 2,500, was transferred to Hamburg, where the inhabitants were ordered by the Kaiser to provide for them.

Dwellings Demolished. In the two days that followed practically every dwelling, casino and boat-house was demolished by the soldiers. From every point of the island the wide sweep of the sea was visible. Not a single obstruction nor a single menace to the underground storerooms and magazines remained; a hundred shells might be exploded simultaneously on the island and not a fire would be started.

At the same time more than 100 submarines were rushed to Heligoland and anchored close up to the Uterland, where they would be protected from the storms that rage over the North Sea during the Autumn and Winter months.

BEADED NOVELTIES ARE HERE

Woven Chains for Neck Wear Among the Attractive Trinkets Which Have Been Imported.

Among the trinkets which have been imported to this country and are selling in various places are chains to be worn around the neck. To say that they are woven does not in the least degree describe the intricacy of the patterns and designs.

One, for instance, of electric blue and silver beads, is woven in patches about an inch and a half long by a half inch wide, strung together by a dozen or more strands of the beads, on straight strings, these strands being, again, about two inches in length. At the end, for a pendant, there is a square, dangling midway between the throat and waist, woven in an enlargement of the pattern displayed in the other bits of weaving.

This chain, or whatever you wish to call it, was worn with a street gown of black satin. The gown itself was entirely without trimming and it had one of those very popular and beautiful neck lines reaching in a straight line from shoulder to shoulder. This enabled the chain to show against the whiteness of skin for a space, and then to appear shining against the shiny blackness of the satin. The effect was decidedly interesting, and the beads held one's attention as a beautiful jewel might have done.
