

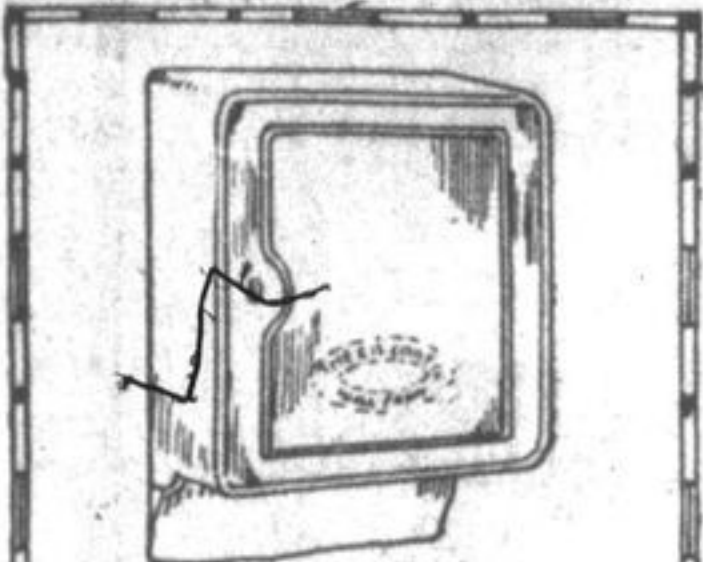

## DEATH OF JAMES PECK, A PROMINENT RESIDENT.

### Canon Fitzgerald Spoke At Orange "At Home"—Hon. Howard Ferguson Speaks On Good Roads.

Lansdowne, March 19.—On Thursday evening, March 15th, Jas. Peck passed away after an illness of about five years though not confined in bed except for a few days. He was a son of the late Ephraim and Mrs. Beck and leaves a widow, formerly Miss Helen Wallis, and two small children, Mary and Wallace, and one sister, Mrs. Emma Webster. The deceased was in his fiftieth year and was a most upright citizen and highly esteemed by the community. Until the last few years he was a successful farmer, but ill-health compelled him to retire. He was a Methodist in religion and a Liberal in politics, also a member of the I.O.O.F. for over twenty-five years and was the possessor of a jewel of the order. He was also a mason and a forester. The funeral was held on Saturday from his late residence under the auspices of the I.O.O.F. order and the remains were placed in the Lansdowne vault. To the widow and relatives much sympathy is extended. On Monday evening, March 17th, L.O.L. No. 26 held an "At Home" in the I.O.O.F. assembly hall which has a most successful affair. After a splendid supper the guests gathered in the town hall where an excellent programme was presented. The speaker of the evening was Canon W. F. 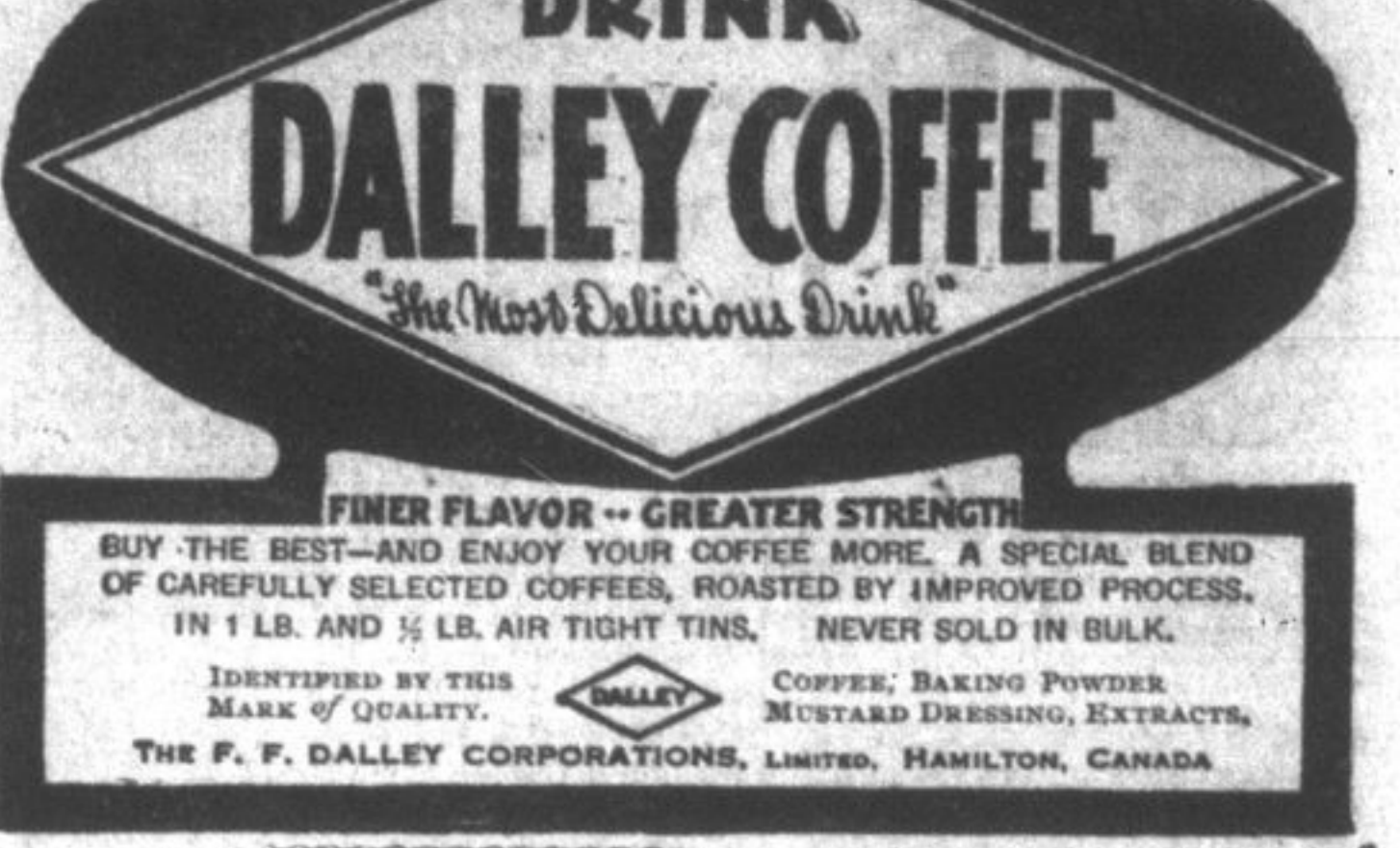

# Bath Red Cross Work.

Bath, March 19.—The Bath Red Cross Society, organized in October, 1914, held its final meeting on Thursday, March 13th. The statement issued speaks the tireless devotion and energy of its members during the past four years. The number of articles shipped away included 1,520 pajamas and hospital shirts, 1,520 pairs socks, 750 various articles, including 150 pillow slips, 134 sheets, 9 quilts, blankets, pillows, towels, bandages, etc., with 295 jars canned fruit. In addition, 67 Christmas boxes were sent overseas.

The total amount of money raised from various sources entertainments, fees, donations, etc., was \$2,186.52. Expenditure (supplies, endowments of 4 hospital beds, England, motor ambulances donations, cash to headquarters, etc.), \$3,116.63, leaving a balance of \$69.89 on hand, which is being held awaiting the decision of the Central Council as to the peace-time policy of the Canadian Red Cross.

Resolutions were passed expressing appreciation of the work of the officers of branch and thanks to Con-way Women's Institute, for the loan of a lodge and library for valuable assistance rendered. The grateful thanks of the society is extended to all who so generously supported it throughout the period of its existence. The serving of afternoon tea brought the last of a long and momentous meetings to a pleasant closing.

# Death of a Pioneer.

Pine Shade, March 16.—At North Sherbrooke a much respected resident in the person of William Sargeant entered into rest on March 13rd. Deceased had been in poor health for some time. He was eighty-six years of age, and was one of the pioneers, carving out of an unbroken forest a comfortable home. Over sixty years ago he married Miss Janet Wilson of Elgin. There were born to them five sons and five daughters—Robert, of Brooke; John, of McDonald's Corners; William Andrew, of Westport; David, on the homestead; a son who died in infancy; Mrs. Thomas Briggs and Mrs. Purdon, of Pevasan; Mrs. John Truelove and Mrs. John Buchanan, his two eldest daughters, and an infant daughter, predeceased him a number of years ago. Deceased was industrious and a good neighbor. He was an Anglican in religion. The writer can well remember him and his worthy wife walking four miles to teach Sunday school classes. Rev. Herbert Pringle conducted the funeral service. The remains were conveyed to Crawford's cemetery and placed beside those of his wife and mother.
