

Arrived on Sunday Evening-The Heroes Were Warmly Greeted. Fifty soldiers, all of them casualties, arrived on Sunday evening at the G.T.R. station. Mayor Newman gave an address of welcome on behalf of the city, in which he expressed the admiration and gratitude of all for the noble sacrifices made by them in devotion to duty. 


