QUEEN'S DETERMINED TO BRING BACK REPUTATION.

Rugby Players Will Have to Sleep and Eat at the University—Big Season Expected.

A professional coach for Queen's University rugby team for this season will be secured as soon as a contract can be closed with some of the men who are now being considered for the position. The students are determined that 1919 will bring to Queen's a success than formerly on the rugby field, and are planning to make a determined effort to gain the honors which have so often slipped out of their grasp. To compete successfully with McGill and Varsity, a paid coach and a rigid system of training for the players will be necessary, and plans are now well under way towards this. One of the points in the scheme is to have the players sleep and eat at Queen's under the direction of their coach during the season. An announcement as to the coach to be chosen will probably be made this week, and with it will come details of the plans for the future in rugby, hockey, fencing and other sports into which the local students next year will make a plunge to bring back the old reputation won in athletics by Queen's.

Fifty soldiers, all of them casualties, arrived on Sunday evening at the G.T.R. station. A great throng of citizens was on hand to welcome them and the Salvation Army band played "Home Sweet Home" as the train drew in to the station. Mayor Newman gave an address of welcome on behalf of the city, in which he expressed the admiration and gratitude of all for the noble sacrifice made by them in devotion to duty. He expressed the hope for their speedy recovery from the injuries they suffered and assured them that everything possible would be done to bring about that result. At the conclusion of the address three cheers were given, in which all of the people joined. The casualties officer had motors on hand to convey the men to Queen's military hospital.
