## WOMAN HAD A BLACK EYE

BUT COURT DID NOT HOLD MAN ACCUSED RESPONSIBLE

A Case in Yiddish Featured Session of Police Court Wednesday Morning—After Much Evidence Had Been Taken, Case Dismissed.

How did Mrs. Anna Litovitz, wife of Isaac Litovitz, come to get a black eye? This was the question that Magistrate Farrell, with the assistance of two lawyers, tried to solve at the Police Court on Wednesday. Hyman Rosen, a young man, was charged with having given the "punch" that discolored the lady's face, but he stoutly denied the charge, and after the hearing of the evidence which was given both in English and Yiddish, Carl Goldman, acting as interpreter, the magistrate dismissed the charge against Rosen. Rosen and his wife, who own a couple of rooms in Mrs. Litovitz's house, March 20th was the day of the "doings." Mrs. Rosen and Mrs. Litovitz had some trouble in which a gas bill and a baby took a prominent part. Mrs. Rosen sent a rush call for her husband, stating that she was so nervous she could not stand the row in the house. Her husband came home, and then the plot thickened. Just what did happen is hard to say, for the evidence was conflicting, but at any rate Mrs. Litovitz declared that Rosen had struck her with his fist, but Rosen and his wife swore that this was not true. Rosen's father-in-law told about Mrs. Litovitz slapping Rosen in the face, and afterwards he saw Mrs. Litovitz fall on the floor, "just like a bullet," he explained. It was stated that Mrs. Litovitz had a broom in one hand and a bottle of coal oil in the other. She might have had the intention of pouring oil on the trouble, but nothing was said about her intentions.

A. B. Cunningham appeared on behalf of Rosen, who pleaded "not guilty," and T. J. Rigney conducted the prosecution, and after all had been said (and the hearing lasted over an hour), Magistrate Farrell was not convinced that Rosen was responsible for the black eye exhibited by Mrs. Litovitz, so he dismissed the case, which will now have to be added to the list of unsolved mysteries. One theory is that the woman injured herself when she fell on the floor.

"Capt. Smith," called the magistrate, but the military man wanted was conspicuous by his absence. Two men who occupied the "benches" bobbed up, and it was explained that they were in charge of an I.S.C. automobile which, it was alleged, had passed a standing street car.

"Where did this happen?" asked one of the men.

"At the corner of Pembroke and King street," said Chief Nesbitt. "I will enlarge the case for a day," remarked the magistrate. "We can't go on with the case until Capt. Smith has been served."
