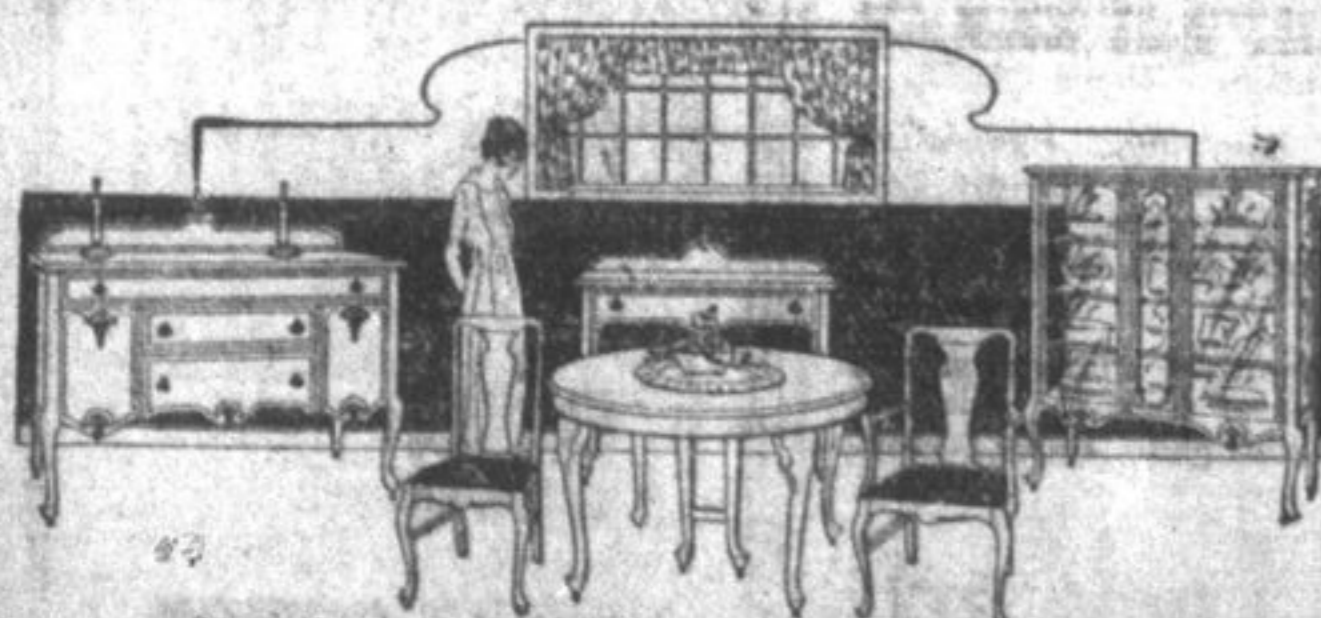

VISITED QUEBEC.

Executive Officers of the C.P.R. Had a Good Time.

Quebec, March 26.—Over two hundred officers and chiefs in charge of the executive appointments of the Canadian Pacific Railway scattered along the system from coast to coast and from the various centres of the United States C.P.R. agencies, visited the ancient city of Quebec over the week-end, arriving on Sunday night by a special train made up of ten Pullman passenger sleepers and two dining cars. The officials were in charge of J. McMillan, manager in charge of the company's telegraph system, and include representatives of the civil engineering department, legal department, store and purchasing departments, operating department, secret service representatives of telegraph system, dining and sleeping car service passenger departments, land department and heads of United States agencies etc. The officials had attended a convention at Montreal, which ended in that city with a banquet given by the chief executive of the C.P.R. on Saturday night. The party broke up here yesterday afternoon at one o'clock by a visit to the Quebec bridge, when many proceeded to their respective homes and quite a few remaining over in Quebec for a couple of days to see the city. His Worship Mayor Lavigne, who had previously received an invitation to meet the officials on their arrival and dine with them at the Chateau, met the visitors and wished them welcome in their arrival. The dinner later served was absolutely informal.
