## Y.M.C.A. CAMPAIGN OPENS

THE ASSOCIATION REQUIRES TO RAISE SUM OF \$6,000.

The Earnest Co-operation of the Citizens is Asked—The Y.M.C.A. is Doing Splendid Work.

The annual campaign of the Young Men's Christian Association opened on Tuesday evening with a rally of enthusiastic workers. Captain E. W. Skinner, late of the 253rd Battalion, C.E.F., president, occupied the chair. The financial statement which was presented by R. H. Ward, chairman of the Finance Committee, showed that the total revenue last year was \$7171.92, which was made up of \$1231.59 from membership fees, \$1995.82 from popular subscriptions, incidental charges \$586.65, and a balance from the previous year of \$1457.86; expenditure, \$7171.32; deficit to Dec. 31st, 1918, \$1910.83. The amount to be raised in the present campaign is \$6,000 and aims to reduce the deficit by \$1,000.

Captain Skinner, who knows of the great work done by the Y.M.C.A. both overseas and in Canada, requested the earnest co-operation of all citizens in making the campaign this year a success. Mayor H. W. Newman spoke at length. He said he was glad to be associated with such a great institution as the Y.M.C.A., and to be present to give it the stamp of civic approval. There had been many calls made upon the people of late but he was certainly convinced that the Y.M.C.A. was one of the most noble causes and entitled to the most generous support. It was doing a great work among our young boys and also very valuable work among our soldiers who showed by their patronage a keen appreciation of the many privileges it afforded to them. W. H. Dyde expressed the great pleasure felt by all at the presence of Captain Skinner, the president, Major Frank Partridge and Lieut. Granger, who had given splendid service overseas.

The directors feel that the importance of the institution in the social life of the community calls upon them to make a strong appeal for financial support. The present year being a period of transition, the need for a most efficient service is readily apparent. During normal times the city youths and college students are the chief patrons. Returned soldiers are presented with a six months' membership ticket and they avail themselves of the privileges in large numbers. The local service is controlled 625 boys for farm service last summer from the high schools and neighboring towns. It now has by means of concentration on the work for boys and young men, a larger number between the ages of 15 and 19 years than ever in its history.

The work of the Kingston institution must be kept strong because of the vital work it is doing for returned men and the youths of the city. It has become permanent because of the character of its work, and an investment in it is a description is an investment in the manhood of our city and community.

Teams of business men will canvass the city each day this week and citizens are requested to make generous contributions toward the current year's expenses.

## Military Matters

A call has come from Halifax for doctors to be transferred to the medical staff there for disembarkation and some local officers will probably accept a transfer for this purpose.

The S.S. Empress of Britain, which is due to arrive at St. John on April 1st, has on board six officers and eighty-eight men for the Kingston district.

Hereafter, all troop trains, except hospital trains, are to stop at Tote de Pont barracks. The hospital trains will proceed to the railway station.
