Letters to the Editor

Mr. Shaw Writes Again.
 Bolingbroke, March 22.—(To The Editor.) Some time ago I wrote you some of my ideas concerning the tariffs, free trade, etc. Well, I have received several letters asking me for an explanation on some things mentioned in that letter, and as a means of economy and also to explain to others who no doubt would like an explanation also, I seek to set air my views through the medium of your valuable paper. First, I would like to say a few words concerning a nice little poem written by John Oxenham, entitled, "Our need," as it is right in line with what I want to say. He says we want honest men in highest places, and asks for one such man among us. Let me say that there are lots of just such men, but, unluckily for us, they are not in the proper place. They are not in the circle, not in the ring, not in the limelight, not on the platform. You might find them in the stable, or on the lakes fishing, maybe in some of the back seats, but as long as party spirit rules they will never get to the front. Grafters, oppressors and extortioners will see to it that no man who is likely to interfere with any of their plans gets any chance to do so.

But there is a time coming, and I believe it is coming soon, when the angel with the key and the great chain is going to lay hold of the old serpent, and shut him up and put a seal upon him, so that he shall devour the nations no more for a thousand years. You have no doubt all attended some of the many churches and listened to some very eloquent sermons, but it has probably never been explained to you and therefore not generally known, and the reason why you will find by putting together or the following passages of scripture: H. Tim. 4: 3 to 4; H. Tim. 3: 1 to 7; Micah. 3: 11; Ezk. 22: 12; 26 to 29v.

But remember that the natural man receiveth not the things of the spirit, neither can he know them because they are spiritually discerned. Therefore you have got to have the spirit of understanding to understand spiritual things. Education will not suffice. So, as I have said, it is not generally known that as soon as the way is prepared by the spirit of right and reason that will lay hold of the old serpent, the spirit of partyism, the cause of division and all the evils thereof in party church, party politics and party societies, that then there shall be a resurrection of the dead in Christ, the first resurrection and a new dispensation will begin, a dispensation of universal peace, when the saints, the twelve apostles, shall judge the world for a thousand years, and Christ shall walk and talk with his people. Then Satan shall be set free again and go out as mad as a roaring lion seeking whom he may devour, and there shall be a time of trouble such as never was since there was a world, for a time, times and a half, no doubt about two and a half years, according to our way of counting time. Seems as though the old had been laying in a store of bad plans while being shut up, and fully intends to make up for lost time, for he soon stirs up the people and engages in the greatest war that ever was, that ends by the whole earth being destroyed and the whole bunch being cast into the lake of fire according to Isa., Eze. Dan. and Rev. Now, the grafter, the extortioner and the oppressor certainly will not enjoy this dispensation of peace, for the Bible says that they shall be consumed out of the lands. The Bible says that anyone who compels another to pay more for any article than it is really worth is an extortioner, a thief and a robber. But, says some, all we have to do is to believe in the Lord Jesus Christ and we shall be saved. True, but many of these

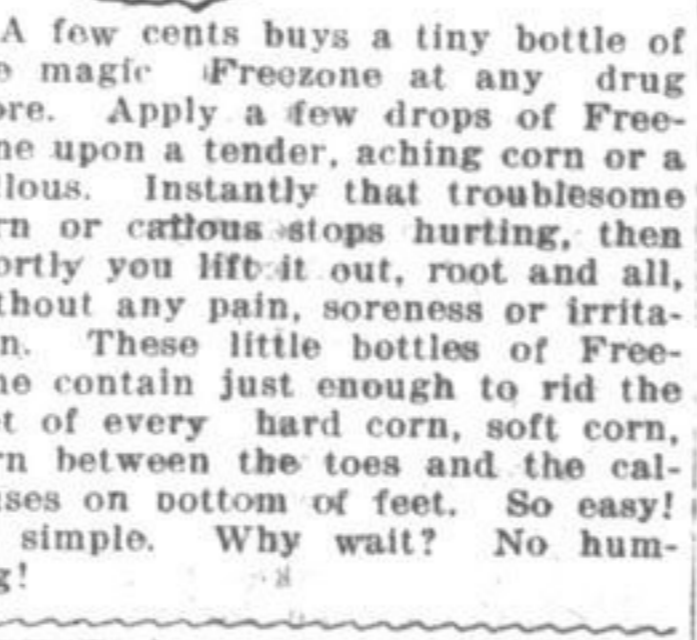
people are not in Christ, and their faith, lacking work, is dead, and so their very prayers are a sin. Don't forget that Christ died for the living, not the dead; that the whole Trinity has a certain part to do to complete our salvation. First, it is God the Father who forgives our sins; God, the Son, whose blood cleanses us from all sin. (Don't get those mixed) and God, the Holy Ghost, that indwells the ones thus favored.

But to come back to the subject of unions and combines under the name of unions, which are many. True unity is a glorious thing if it is in a good cause. Most unions are only a combine to protect a certain class or enterprise at the expense of the outsider. For instance, a united government is all right as far as governments are concerned, and united farmers are far as farmers are concerned, and so on through every walk of life. But a union of this or that class is not enough. What we want, what we must have, is a united people, free from all partyism as class, a universal union of true brotherhood, including all classes and creeds. The Bible says we are all members of one body, and that one member cannot say, "I have no need of other members." As all members are needed to make one perfect body, as many pieces are needed to make one perfect house, as it takes branches to make a perfect tree, so it takes all kinds of people to make a world, and we as members are one of another. Any way we cannot get away from this fact: We are all members of the human race. We have necessarily certain dealings with each other, but otherwise we have no fellowship, no more respect for each other than the wild animals who devour each other if they can. I have written more than I intended to, and I fear I shall tax your patience, Mr. Editor, and occupy too much of your paper, but I only hope those remarks will do somebody some good and advance the cause of right and reason.

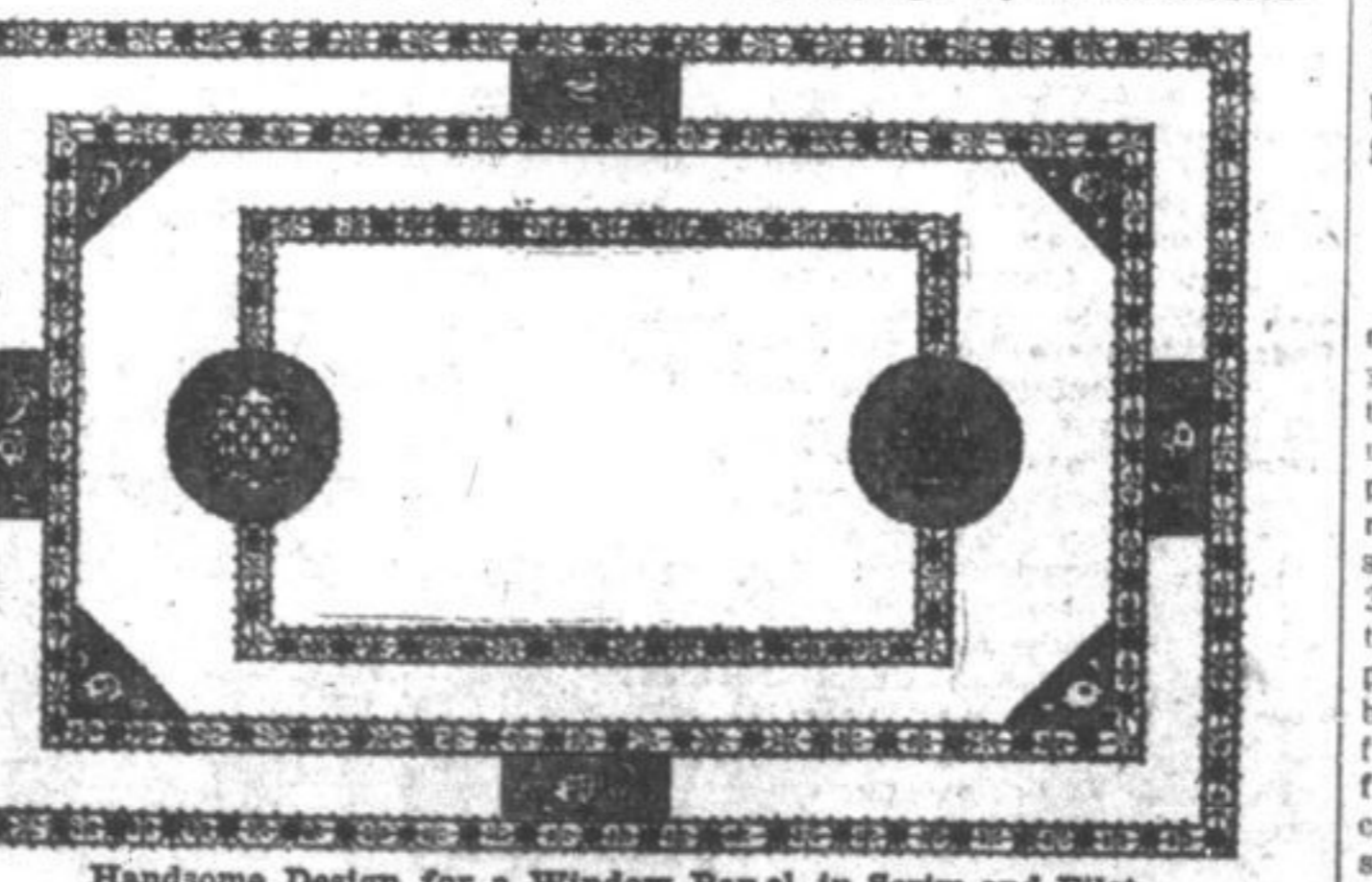

dows. It is made of scrim, inset with bands of insertion and bordering with edging. The most delightful feature of the panel, however, is the motifs of fillet crochet. They are arranged most effectively at the corners where the insertion is turned and at the center.

There are many uses to which the motifs may be put, for in the full set there are fifteen different designs. If one desired to make an entire set, consisting of curtains, bedspread and dresser scarf, the motifs may be repeated and alternated with squares of scrim or linen. In ecru or white mercerized cotton they are equally effective. Very often the design is more effective worked in ecru linen than in white, especially if it is to be used to decorate household articles.

The bodour pillow is original for many reasons, but especially interesting is its oval shape. It may be closed in at center of back. The monogram used on this pillow is L.S.M. ("S" being the letter of the surname). It is 5 inches high. These letters were thickly padded and worked in the raised satin and stem stitches. The monogram is not included in the transfer pattern. The pillow pattern is 11 1/2 inches wide by 24 inches long. A pillow 9 inches wide by 22 inches long will fit this oval design.


