Tormenting cats and dogs was common when a small boy was not easily caught. The slingers, the throwers of other missiles and the tormentors of animals were surely not all born in May. Nor were all boys born in May skilled in rude or ingenious torturing.


Defective children.

Some startling statements were made by Mr. George A. Jutnam, superintendent of Women's Institutes, at the Western Ontario Dairymen's Convention, relative to the physical condition of children in rural schools in Ontario. As a result of an investigation covering 20,000 children, in various parts of the province, Mr. Putnam said 65 per cent, were in need of attention by the dentist, 10 per cent, suffered from defective hearing, 10 per cent. from defective eyesight and 33 per cent, from adenoids or enlarged ton-

"The condition of children in rural schools is lower than that of children in city schools," Mr. Putnam said. This statement, however, is hardly borne out by a report recently made by Medical Officer Hastings relative to conditions in Toronto. Fifty per cent, of the children attending Toronto schools are, Dr. Hastings said, suffering from physical defects other than those affecting the teeth. But in both cases a condition exists that calls for prompt attention.

Hun Had Found Picture. Negrly four years ago Mrs. Lanchetfi, of Toronto, sent a postcard group photograph of herself, her husband and two daughters to her son, Pie. Frank Lanchetti, with the 75th attalion in England, then on his vay to France. He was wounded on August 4 last year after much hard fighting and is now slowly recovering from wourds in the back. His father has gone to see him. The other day Mrs. Lanchetti received from B. Lunau, a Toronto boy with the Canadian troops, the picture she had sent to her son. On the back he wrote that he had got the picture from a "Fritz" and had forwarded it to the family address on the back. It apparently had been lost on the battlefield by Pte. Lanchetti, picked up by the German and recovered by Pte.




