### ANOTHER BOTTLE MYSTERY

PICTURED IN MONDAY MORNING SESSION OF POLICE COURT.

Young Man Had Bottle of Liquor When Arrested, But Did Not Know How It Came Into His Possession.

Where did a young man get a bottle of whiskey? This was the question before Magistrate Farrell at the Blue Monday morning session of the police court. The accused had no recollection whatever as regards where he had secured his bottle, but Constable Leslie Armstrong, who arrested him on the street at 1 a.m. Monday, told about the accused throwing away a quart bottle as he was about to place him under arrest. Said bottle was placed on the magistrate's desk. There was just about one good drink left in it, and as his worship got a sniff of it, he pronounced it as whiskey. There were two charges against the prisoner, that of being intoxicated and having liquor in a place other than a private dwelling. On the former charge he was fined \$10 and costs or one month, and on the latter charge \$200 and costs or three months, sentences to run concurrently.

Constable Armstrong had a witness who told about seeing the accused throw away the bottle as the constable was about to place him under arrest.

The prisoner told the magistrate that he had been drinking beer at the Army and Navy headquarters on Sunday night. The beer evidently did not have the necessary "kick" to suit him, as he added some nervaline to it.

"How did you come to go to the Army and Navy rooms?" queried the magistrate, who noticed that the accused was wearing civilian clothes.

"I joined the association last night," replied the accused, who added that he had been close on to two years in the service.

Magistrate Farrell wanted to find out where the bottle of liquor came from, but the prisoner declared that he did not know where the liquor came from.

In reply to the magistrate, the accused said he did not have the bottle of liquor when he went into the Army and Navy rooms, and also swore that he did not remember getting the bottle after he came out of the rooms. He left the rooms about midnight and was gathered in by the police constable about three-quarters of an hour later.

### CAUSE OF INCONVENIENCE

#### LEGAL AND MILITARY OFFICES ADHERE TO OLD TIME.

It Will Mean Practically a Wasted Hour in These Offices as the Public Will Use New Time.

The effect of the daylight saving system, being adopted by many municipalities is going to cause inconvenience to several public offices in the city. In offices of the Court House will have to continue on Standard time, and all courts, etc., will have to adhere to the old standard. The public will have to remember that the time of filing documents, etc., will be based on the standard and not on the daylight saving method. This will undoubtedly cause a great amount of inconvenience and every effort will be made to overcome the trouble.

The military offices, particularly those dealing with the re-establishment of the soldiers, will be effected. These offices, while working with the public is administered from Ottawa and the standard time will have to be adhered to. It will mean that for an hour every afternoon there will be no work done as by that time, the general public will have left their work down town and gone home. It is understood that a request has been submitted to have the office hours changed to meet those of the municipality.
