INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS ARRANGED FOR NEXT SEASON

Royal Military College Enters Senior Rugby—Officers and Schedules of the Various Departments of Intercollegiate Sport—Hockey Under O.H.A. Rules.

An intercollegiate athletic conference took place at Queen's University on Saturday afternoon for the purpose of re-organization. The delegates present were from McGill, Varsity, the Royal Military College and Queen's; and the departments of sport dealt with were rugby, soccer, hockey, tennis, basketball, harrier, track, boxing, fencing, swimming and wrestling.

Committees were formed for each department. Officers were elected and schedules were drawn up in conformity with the sequence in operation before the war. Some amendments to the rules governing the different sports were suggested that will be referred to the executive committee for confirmation. The delegates manifested the keenest enthusiasm and the utmost unanimity prevailed. The delegates were received by Prof. John Matheson and Dr. J. M. Hazlett on behalf of Queen's.

Intercollegiate Rugby.

Officers: Hon. president, E. O. Shier, of Queen's; president, W. T. Holmes, of Varsity; first vice-president, A. C. Dunbar, of R.M.C.; second vice-president, R. R. Laing, McGill.

The Royal Military College was admitted to the senior series. A rules committee was appointed to meet on April 15th. The next annual meeting is to be held at Montreal. The senior schedule:

October 11.—Queen's at Toronto; McGill at R.M.C.

Oct. 18.—McGill at Queen's; R.M.C. at Toronto.

Oct. 25.—Toronto at Queen's; R.M.C. at McGill.

Nov. 1.—Queen's at R.M.C.; McGill at Toronto.

Nov. 8.—Queen's at McGill; Toronto at R.M.C.

Nov. 15.—R.M.C. at Queen's; Toronto at McGill.

Intercollegiate—Eastern and western groups to declare winners by Nov. 8th. Eastern, McGill at Queen's on Oct. 18th, and Queen's at McGill on Nov. 8th. The western teams will consist of Toronto H., McMaster and St. Michael's. The finals are to be played, Western at Eastern on Nov. 15th, and Eastern at Western on Nov. 22nd.

Nov. 22nd. W. T. Holmes to be convenor western group.

Junior—Eastern teams will consist of K.C.I., Queen's H. and R. M. C. H. A. C. Dunbar to be convenor, and the winners to be declared by Nov. 8th.

Western teams will consist of McMaster, O.A.C., St. Michael's and Varsity H. The winner to be declared by Nov. 8th. Finals—Eastern at Western on Nov. 15th, and Western at Eastern on Nov. 22nd.

Rugby referees named were—Varsity, Dr. Wright, Hugh Gall, Charles Gage and William Faulds; McGill, Eric Reid, George Laing, William Morrison, S. McEvener; R.M.C., N. H. MacCaulay, E. A. Green, George Blackcock; Queen's, E. O. Shier, Prof. J. F. MacDonald, Prof. Lindsay Malcolm, J. M. Haight.

Hockey is to be played under the O.H.A. rules, and each club is to give five names of referees at the beginning of the season. The officers elected were: Hon. president, Dr. C. K. Clarke, Toronto; president, G. R. Davidson, of Queen's; vice-president, V. P. Heney, of McGill; second vice-president, Cadet C. G. Ross, of the R.M.C.; secretary-treasurer, J. G. Countryman, of Toronto. The games are to begin on January 24th and to be played in the following order: Varsity at McGill; Queen's at Varsity; McGill at Queen's; McGill at Varsity; Queen's at McGill; Varsity at Queen's.

Wrestling, Boxing and Fencing. President, J. E. Musgrove, of Toronto; secretary, P. Wythe, of Montreal.

The meet will be held at Queen's on the last Friday and Saturday in February, 1920; at Montreal in 1921, and at Toronto in 1922. The following suggested amendments are referred to the rules committee: The value of a knock down in boxing to be decided; the adoption of a system of judging wrestling by points, skill in attack and defence to be considered as well as the fall.

Tennis. A meet to be held on Queen's ground under the management of R. M.C. in the middle of October. Officers: Honorary president, Prof. W. R. V. Bridger, R.M.C.; president, R. W. Kramer, of McGill; vice-president, W. B. Dixon, of Toronto; secretary-treasurer, J. C. Russell, R.M.C., member of executive, H. A. Horton.

Basketball. The schedule to be adopted is to conform to the hockey schedule. Officers: Honorary president, Prof. Burton, Toronto; president, W. G. Peever, of Queen's; vice-president, C. H. Uppahart, of Toronto; secretary-treasurer, W. M. Bourke, of McGill.

Association Football. The schedule is to follow rugby and the games are to be played in the morning. Officers: President, J. B. Townsend, of Queen's; vice-president, G. A. Parkins, of McGill; secretary-treasurer, A. L. Huether, of Toronto.

Track Athletics. A meet will be held this year at McGill on condition that the expenses be met by McGill. The condition was accepted and Toronto agreed because Montreal will be opening the new stadium. Officers: President, Dr. W. E. Brown, of Toronto; secretary, Cadet McDonald, of the R.M.C.

Harriers. A meet will be held at Montreal during the track meet, about the middle of November. R.M.C. entered. Officers: President, Lieut. S. Cuthbert; secretary, J. K. Pomeroy.

Swimming. A meet is to be held at Montreal at a date to be decided later by mutual agreement. Officers are to be elected later.

The delegates present were: Royal Military College—Major Hanson, football; Major Lawson, hockey; Prof. Day, track; Prof. Bridger, tennis; Lieut. S. Cuthbert, harrier; Cadets Dunbar, McDougall, Russell, Ross.

Queen's—Dr. J. M. Hazlett, rugby; G. R. Davidson, hockey; J. B. Townsend, soccer; G. Peever, basketball; R. Norton, tennis; J. T. Pomeroy, harrier; S. Shier, track; P. Wythe, boxing, fencing, wrestling.

McGill—R. Laing, football; V. Heney, hockey; J. L. O'Brien, track; M. Adams, boxing, fencing, wrestling; M. Bourke, basketball; H. Fisk, swimming; R. Kramer, tennis; G. A. Parkins, football.

To Form Rugby League. Efforts are now being made to form an English Rugby League in Eastern Canada and it is likely that McGill, M.A.A. and Royal Military College of Kingston will enter teams. McGill and M.A.A. had representative fifteen before the war, but it will be a new venture for R.M.C.

English Rugby is very popular in British Columbia, and also in the Maritime Provinces, where it is played extensively. It has never gained a footing in Ontario, and in Montreal did not attract much of a following.
