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GETTING WORK FOR SOLDIERS.
Representative interviews every man discharged into Civil Life.
The office which the repatriation committee has opened in the Bank of Toronto building, is devoted chiefly to the task of obtaining employment for returned discharged soldiers. The work, however, is not all done in this office. At Barriefield, by arrangement with the military authorities, T. Murray, a representative of the committee, interviews every man who is being discharged to civil life, and before the soldier is issued his pay checks, passes through the hands of this representative, and if jobs are required, all particulars are taken down and recorded on index cards, both alphabetically and according to occupation sought. If suitable positions are on record in the head office on King street, as being available, the applicant is given a letter of introduction to the prospective employer, or is personally introduced to him. But if not, telephone calls are made upon employers whose names appear on the committee's list as "sympathetic employers," and in this way many a job has been unearthed. Of course, in the majority of cases, the soldier being discharged is not thinking of an immediate job, so he simply registers, and when he is ready to go to work he calls at the King street office, where the committee is ready to help him to secure a position as speedily as possible.

LOWER ELECTRIC RATES BENEFIT EVERYBODY
One Industry Saves \$1,700—General Hospital Bill \$435 a Year Less.

Chairman R. F. Elliott was warmly congratulated to-day over the reduction in electrical rates made by the Utilities Commission at its meeting yesterday afternoon. The chairman had a Hydro-Electric Commission engineer here for several days last week going over the local situation, and the rates proposed by the Kingston commission was finally endorsed. The permission of the provincial commission has to be secured before a local commission can change its electrical rates.
The reduction of the lowest power rate from one cent a kilo-watt-hour to 15 cents means a reduction of eighty-five per cent. One industry in the east end will save \$1,700 this year as the result. This new rate should aid in bringing industries to Kingston.
Chairman Elliott says that those operating under the commercial rate have been well treated in the general reduction. Their rates drop twenty-five per cent. As an instance, how institutions and churches will benefit, Chairman Elliott states that the General Hospital electrical bill will be \$435 less this year as the result of the dropping of the rates.

The Late Peter B. Gamble.
The death of Peter Brown Gamble occurred on Monday morning at his residence, 368 Barrie street, after a short illness. Mr. Gamble had not been in good health for some years. He was sixty-seven years of age and was born in the county of Hastings, but lived at Owen Sound for a number of years. He is survived by his widow, four daughters, Mrs. Paul Wilson and Mrs. John Wilson at Simcoe, and Mrs. W. E. Norton and Mrs. R. Spicer of Kingston. One brother, Robert, resides at Simcoe. The funeral will be conducted by the Orange Lodge at 2 p.m. on Wednesday. Interment will take place at Owen Sound.

The Total For Three Months of 1919 is \$19,300.

DETRIMENTAL RUMORS
Tending to Injure a Restaurant Proprietor.
Some ill disposed person or persons for some time have been attempting to injure a restaurant proprietor in the city. Rumors detrimental to his business were started and spread to some extent. Dr. A. R. B. Williamson, Medical Health Officer, has made an investigation and found that the rumors were absolutely without foundation. It is the intention of the proprietor to take legal action against the person or persons who made the slanderous statements if they can be found or against any person repeating them. He will be glad to give a substantial reward to any one who will give him information as to the person or persons who first made the statements or as to any one who repeats them from this time.

BIG FALLING OFF.
Exports During First Quarter of Last Year Were Much Greater.
There is a decided falling off in a total of exports from this port during the first quarter of 1919 as compared to the first quarter of 1918. Last year there was a total of \$1,140,509.92, while this year the amount is about half, being only \$551,136.71. The main decrease is caused by the non-shipping this year of ammunition, brass, rye, hay, leather and woolen sox which were in great demand a year ago.
