## GETS SIX MONTHS IN JAIL

### JUDGE LAVELL SENTENCES MAN FOR RECEIVING STOLEN GOODS.

#### The Evidence Showed That Alleged Murderess Freq. His House and Stole Her Husband's Goods.

Harvey Wood, Kennecob, was sentenced by Judge Lavell on Wednesday morning at a special sitting of the county judge's criminal court, to six months in jail for receiving stolen goods.

Wood was charged with having received from Mrs. Lovice Thompson, now waiting her trial on the charge of murdering her baby, a safety razor, an oil cloth table cover and some towels. These goods were the property of Lovice Thompson and were stolen by his wife and given to Wood. Wood's defence was practically a confession, as he claimed he borrowed the goods from Mrs. Thompson.

In giving evidence, the judge mentioned that the prisoner knew that he was creating trouble in the Thompson home when Mrs. Thompson frequented his house, and he therefore knew that the goods had been taken without Thompson's permission. The reason for this was that the sentence was not made with a consideration to the trivial value of the goods stolen. T. J. Rigney represented the prisoner and J. L. Whiting was prosecutor.

### TO MAKE INVESTIGATION

#### Into the Escape of a Prisoner From Penitentiary.

Inspector W. S. Hughes is coming to Kingston to-day to investigate the recent escape of a prisoner named Leo R. Rogers, after assaulting the gate keeper, who had opened the gate to receive a note from him. Guard Berrigan, who received a knife wound in the back that pierced the lung, and another in the abdomen that pierced the stomach and liver, is reported to be recovering.

It is reported that the lack of vigilance that enabled Rogers to pass round the wall and leave the reserve without being challenged, when three sentries should have seen him, and one of whom could have stopped him, will also be a subject for inquiry. A guard was recently suspended for being asleep while on duty at the quarry.

To Gather At Berlin. (Canadian Press Despatch) Zurich, April 2.—In view of fresh negotiations over the Danzig question, the German cabinet has decided to gather the chiefs of all parties of the national assembly at Berlin tomorrow to reach an agreement as to the policy that is to be followed, according to announcement.

## OBITUARY

The Late Mrs. Mary Kelly. Mrs. Mary Kelly passed away on Monday night at her home in Brewer's Mills, after a short illness. Her husband predeceased her, and she resided with her brother, Thomas Murphy, on the homestead. She is survived by three brothers, Thomas Murphy, of Brewer's Mills; L. W. Murphy and John Murphy, of Kingston, and one sister, Thomas Shortell, of Brewer's Mills.

The Late Rev. R. J. Adamson, M.A. T. D. Minnes, on Wednesday, received the sad news of the passing away of Rev. R. J. Adamson, M.A., on March 13th, at Gracefield manse, Maghera, County Derry, Ireland. In 1901 he married Margaret Minnes, daughter of the late W. P. Minnes, of this city, in London, Eng. From that time until now his religious duties claim his time and attention in the mother land. Loving sympathy is extended to Mrs. Adamson by a large circle of Kingston friends.

The Late William Dunlop. William Dunlop died at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. F. A. Covert, 136 Notre Dame avenue, St. Lambert, Que., Tuesday, after a short illness. Mr. Dunlop was in his seventy-seventh year, being born at Gibraltar on June 12th, 1842. He came to Canada, with his parents, when young, and resided in Kingston, living for years at 56 Union street. He was an ex-alderman of Kingston, a school trustee and president of the Liberal-Conservative Association. He conducted a tailoring business. Mr. Dunlop was a Fenian Raid veteran and three of his sons and a daughter have served in the present war. Capt. H. Dunlop, M.C., of the C.A.M.C., being killed in action on Nov. 2nd last. Deceased leaves five sons, Rev. J. G. Dunlop, of Japan; Lance-Corpl. F. Dunlop, at present overseas; W. B. Dunlop, of Duluth; T. W. Dunlop, of Minneapolis; and R. G. Dunlop, of Saratoga, N.Y.; and three daughters, Mrs. F. A. Covert and Miss Jane Dunlop, of St. Lambert, Que., and Nurse Margaret Dunlop, of the American Expeditionary Force in Germany. The remains will be buried at Kingston, the funeral being from the 1:50 p.m. train from Montreal on Thursday.

The Late Mrs. J. Liddle. The funeral of the late Mrs. James Liddle, who died in the Hotel Dieu on March 28th, took place from the residence of her sister, Mrs. W. A. Tulloch, Division street, on Sunday last, and was attended by a large number of relatives and friends.

The service was conducted by Rev. St. John's church, Portmouth, of which the deceased was an active member. The floral offerings were many and beautiful. The remains were taken to Harrowsmith for interment.

The Late Mrs. Maria Spencer. Death on Sunday removed a much respected resident of the city in the person of Mrs. Maria H. Spencer, widow of the late Robert Spencer, who died forty-seven years ago. Deceased, who was 82 years of age, passed away at her home, No. 4 Redan street, after an illness extending over seven years. Mrs. Spencer was of a kindly disposition, beloved by a wide circle of friends, and in her death Kingston loses a good citizen. She had lived in Kingston practically all her life. Deceased was a member of St. Paul's church. She is survived by one son, Ralph Spencer, of Rochester, N.Y., who some years ago was engaged in the tailoring business in Kingston, and two daughters, Mrs. Robert O'Connell and Mrs. Annie Countryman, both of this city.

The funeral took place Wednesday morning to Cataragui cemetery, and was of a private nature. Canon W. F. Fitzgerald officiated.

A Returned Soldier's Complaint. J. M. Adam, who went overseas with the First Contingent, and returned to the city after spending four years and ten days on active service, writes to the Whig to complain because a Princess street merchant wanted to charge him 25c exchange for cashing a soldier's cheque after hours. The Whig, while sympathizing with Mr. Adam, does not believe that any good purpose would be served by publishing the letter in its entirety. Publication of the name and address of the proprietor of the store would perhaps work him much more harm than the soldier would wish for.
