### Military News

Sergt.-Major Tugwood, late of the 21st Battalion, occupies a desk in the office of the agricultural representative, Market Square, and will conduct an employment bureau along with a civilian representative, who has not yet been named.

Lieut. Askwith, of the C. A. S. C., is a busy man these days, arranging for the transportation of all the returning men to Barrfield barracks. The regular duties of his department might be deemed enough for an ordinary man, but Lieut. Askwith never allows anything to fall down, and the motor trucks and cars are always on hand no matter what hour of the day or night a train arrives, and he is there, too, to see that things run smoothly.

Three more troopship sailings have been announced. The Caronia is due at Halifax on April 6th with two officers and eight N.C.O.'s, and men for Kingston. The Melita is due at St. John on April 6th with one Kingston officer. The Saturnia is due at St. John on April 9th with one officer and seventeen N.C.O.'s, and men for Kingston.

Peterborough is to have no chance of welcoming the 2nd Battalion. That famous unit, according to the Minister of Militia, will be demobilized at Kingston, which dispersal area, General Mewburn states, was chosen by the officers overseas, who have charge of the demobilization for Canada's army.

The C.N.R. special which is carrying the troops from the troopship Canada is due here about midnight Wednesday. There are ten officers, eleven nursing sisters and ninety-nine N.C.O.'s and men for dispersal here.

The party of thirteen men from the Siberian force which left Vancouver on Friday for Kingston is due here this (Wednesday) about midnight.

Capt. McLeod, who has rendered valuable service on medical boards, left to-day for Ottawa.

Major Nell McLeod, president of the local standing medical board, left to-day for Ottawa, where he intends resuming the practice of his profession. When the war broke out he went overseas with the first field ambulance under Col. A. E. Ross.

Brig-Gen. Williams, accompanied by Major McManus, made an inspection of Fort Henry this morning and the detachment stationed there under Major Pearce. The strength of the unit is now 171 men.
