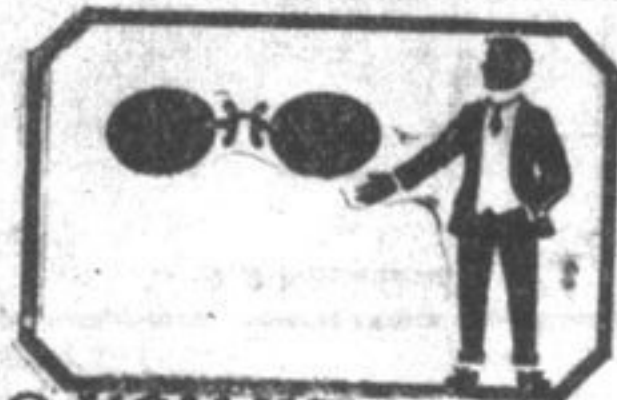

CADETS' BOXING BOUTS

GOOD EXHIBITIONS WITNESSED ON FRIDAY AFTERNOON.

The Finals to Take Place Next Thursday When Mayor Church of Toronto Will Be Present.

The semi-finals in the Royal Military College boxing competition were held on Friday afternoon and the outstanding features were a four round bout between Cadets McLeod and Ferrie of the novice light-weights; Cadets Birmingham and Gillespie, who appeared in two heavy-weight bouts; and the feather-weight bout between Cadets Black and Ross. The knock-out of Southam by McKenzie in the third round of the welter-weights, and Sinclair's defeat, by Loomis by a knock-out in the first round of the middleweights, were dramatic endings of what appeared at the beginning to be well matched contests.

Cadets McLeod and Ferrie of the novice lightweights were evenly matched in attack, defence and counter, and at the end of the third round no decision was rendered. A fourth round was ordered and Ferrie was declared the winner.

In the novice heavyweights Hamilton got the decision over Gillespie after a stiff three round bout. Hamilton was aggressive and fast but Gillespie finished game. Birmingham won from Lewis in the same class and after the other bouts were over met Gillespie in a stubborn battle for first place in the heavy-weight class. It was a beautiful exhibition, for at call for the start neither showed any signs of having been previously engaged. Both were strong and Gillespie was more cautious and determined than in the first bout. Birmingham showed good form and at the end of the second round neither had gained the advantage, but in the third Gillespie got in some blows with telling effect and won the decision.

It was the featherweight bout between Black and Ross that created most excitement. The odds were in favor of Ross, but the lad from the maritime province was a true "blue nose." Ross went to the ropes twice in the first round. He was up like lightning and strongly aggressive, but it was evident that he had met his match. The second round was very fast, both exchanging blows with some effect, and the gong came in a mix-up. In the third round Ross was disqualified for holding his antagonist and the decision went to Black.

On Monday Ross will box Ballantyne in the lightweights and Bigelow will meet Grant. Elliot will meet Hamilton in the heavyweights.

The other results were: Welterweight: McKenzie won from Southam, and Robertson was disqualified for holding Price.

Middleweight: Abers won from Alexander, and Loomis was knocked out by Sinclair.

Heavyweight: Gillespie won from Birmingham.

The finals will take place on Thursday next when Mayor Church of Toronto is expected to be present, and two professionals will give an exhibition bout.
